

# BICYCLE TRACK FOR SALT LAKE

Announcement Made That One Is To Be Built in the Near Future.

## JOHN CHAPMAN'S SCHEME.

Structure Is to Cost About \$40,000 and Construction Is to Begin Soon.

John M. Chapman, last year's manager of the Salt Palace bicycle track, made his announcement last night that a ten-lap track would be built at Salt Lake and ready for business by the opening of the cycle game next season. This has been a pet scheme of Chapman's for a long time and it has finally developed into a definite proposition. The announcement came after a meeting with Manager Langford who will build the track. Its estimated cost is \$40,000 and will be one of the fastest tracks in the country. There will be a roof over it and there will be sides with large sliding doors so that the entire track can be closed in and used for other sports. The track will be a mile long and will be the most modern of its kind in the world. Chapman was east recently for the purpose of arranging matters with the N. C. A. and securing a franchise. All difficulties have been overcome and Chapman says the track will certainly be built for the coming season.

It is not the purpose of the promoters to interfere with the game at the Salt Palace and the new track will be built on the other side of the city. Two races a week will be given but on different dates than those at the local saucer. This would give the fans four races a week, enough to satisfy the most ardent devotees of cycling. The seating capacity for the new track will be 5,000.

## MAYOR BRANSFORD SAYS NO PRIZE FIGHTS

About a dozen Salt Lakeers who wanted to be prize fighters have been working for many days to get the game opened at the Salt Palace. The money made out of the Clifford-Nelson match at Ogden, and the money spent in the Junction City game would be promoters an idea that considerable wealth could be made without the game here. The announcement by the mayor means that local fight fans will have to go elsewhere to witness exhibitions of the manly art.

## BILLY PAPKE WINS.

Forces Stanton's Seconds to Throw Up Boston, Jan. 21.—Billy Papke of Valley Falls, Ill., who claims the middleweight championship of the world, defeated Walter Stanton of San Francisco in four rounds at the Armory Athletic association here tonight. Stanton throughout the first round landed rights and lefts on the body and face, driving Papke from one end of the ring to the other. The punishment, however, did not seem to effect Papke.

The second round was practically a repetition of the first, until near the close, when Papke landed a hard left on Stanton's jaw, drawing blood.

In the third round Papke started in to fight and soon had Stanton in a clinch. He kept the loop-the-loop punch in clinches with good effect.

In the fourth round both started fighting like whirlwinds. In the close-in fighting Papke drove his man around the ring and with a heavy blow to the stomach forced Stanton for the count of nine.

Stanton came back and landed a dozen hard blows, but Papke was too strong, and with a succession of punches sent Stanton down again.

Stanton's seconds threw up the sponge and the bout ended.

## FAST YACHTS TO RACE.

Contest Between Those Owned by Vanderbilt and Gould.

New York, Jan. 21.—A race between the fast yachts owned by Howard Gould and William K. Vanderbilt, Jr., is one of the possibilities of the new year. The two yachts, the *Whisper* and the *Albatross*, are both owned by Mr. Vanderbilt's Tarantula-de-Marine Co. Gould's *Niagara* is a 50-mile course, but it is said that the *Whisper* is faster.

Mr. Vanderbilt offered another race. The race was not possible last summer, but this summer it is expected it will take place. The talk in yachting circles was aroused by the fact that the Gould yacht is having new boilers installed and that the Vanderbilt yacht has been ordered here from Wilmington, C., where it now is, for extensive repairs.

## SARATOGA MEET.

## RIDING TEST.

Modified in Interest of All Permanent Staff Officers Doing Civil Work.

Washington, Jan. 21.—Secy. of War Taft announced tonight that the president has decided to modify the riding test regulations by providing that all permanent staff officers, except cavalry, artillery, and engineers, who are of rank and age likely to be called upon for field operations, may, instead of being required to ride, be tested. This, however, is on condition that the appointing authorities, as commanders, are not promoting them to any position in connection with the line. This decision will release a large number of engineers, who have been requested to be excused. These three men are doing excellent work for the government, being in charge of important river and harbor improvements.

## A FIVE FOOT WOMAN CAPTURES A 6-FT. BURGLAR.

New York, Jan. 22.—Mrs. Hannah Jaeger, 5 feet tall and slender, captured a 6-foot burglar all by herself last night. Mrs. Jaeger's husband is caretaker of an apartment building in Westchester, but of late has been ill and is barely able to get around. Last night, carrying a light, Mrs. Jaeger accompanied her husband to the fifth floor of the building. There they found the brass wardrobe open and a sink had been removed. Just as the discovery was made the burglar, armed with a heavy wrench, jumped out of a closet and tried to strike the light from Mrs. Jaeger's hand. Calling to her husband to run for a policeman, Mrs. Jaeger seized a heavy sack weight which lay on the floor and attacked the intruder. Jaeger ran downstairs as fast as he could and summoned a policeman. When the officer reached the room he found Mrs. Jaeger sitting on the prostrate form of the burglar, still pounding him with the iron weight.

## CURZON MAY HAVE TO CONTEST ELECTION.

Dublin, Jan. 21.—The Dublin Gazette, an official paper, in announcing tonight the fact that Lord Curzon of Kedleston received a majority of the votes at the recent election for a representative peer of Ireland, studiously refuses to commit itself to the statement that he has been elected, and apparently recognizes the possibility of a contest by placing on record the fact that Lord Ashdown was second in the race.

The Gazette goes so far as to point out that Lord Curzon's name does not appear to lie with those entitled to vote on such occasions. The text of the announcement in part, is as follows:

Baron Curzon, of Kedleston has been chosen by a majority of votes to be a peer to sit and vote on the part of Ireland in the house of lords, and whereas, the name of said Baron Curzon of Kedleston is not upon the roll of peers of Ireland, whose right to vote at the election of representative peers for Ireland has been certified by the direction of the house of lords as having been admitted to the house of lords, I hereby give notice that Baron Ashdown, whose name is upon the roll of Irish peers, and who has received the next highest number of votes at said election.

Following precedent, no dispute is given, but it is asserted that the voting was very close and that the former victory of Lord Ashdown, whose majority over Lord Curzon, whose hunting lodge at Clonmel was blown up by peasants last summer.

It has been suggested that his eligibility would be questioned, but at the time his candidacy was first launched he announced that he had taken a high legal opinion on his point. He asserted tonight that his failure to qualify for admission to the roll of Irish peers was due to a technical omission, to which his attention had not been called and which in no way debars him from election as a representative peer.

THE MISSISSIPPI ACCEPTED. Washington, Jan. 21.—The battleship Mississippi was formally accepted by the government today and will be taken over tomorrow morning at the League Island navy yard. She is to be commanded by Capt. John C. Fremont.

## CHICAGO & NORTHWESTERN.

Proposes Extension from Belle Fourche S. D., to Miles City, Mont.

Butte, Mont., Jan. 22.—The Chicago & Northwestern railroad proposes the extension of its system from Belle Fourche, S. D., to Miles City, Mont., and west on to the Pacific coast.

While one of the officials now in the city would state that their visit had anything to do with the contemplated extension, the trip through the northwest is very closely connected with it. Those in the party are: E. B. Ober, general freight agent; C. A. Cairns, general passenger agent, both of the Northwestern; E. B. Ober, general freight agent, St. Paul & Omaha; G. R. Moore, assistant general passenger agent of the same road, who is a part of the Northwestern system.

The Northwestern completed its line to Belle Fourche the past year. Surveys have been completed to Fort Miles City and the steel sufficient to build to Miles City has been collected at Belle Fourche.

## HOTEL KEEPER SUED.

Ground Is Neglect to Give Proper Protection Against Theft.

Chicago, Jan. 22.—William D. Boyce filed suit in the municipal court yesterday against George W. Reynolds, proprietor and manager of the Virginia hotel, for \$5,000. The claim is based on allegation of neglect of Reynolds to give his guests proper protection from loss by theft, in that he had in his employ a chambermaid who entered the rooms occupied by Mr. Boyce and his family and stole \$5,000 worth of diamonds.

## NEW YORK'S NEW THEATER.

New York, Jan. 22.—It is announced that the work on the new theater will be resumed April 1 and will be pushed to a conclusion as rapidly as possible. No work has been done on the building since work was suspended in October for the purpose of making changes in the plans whereby the cost of the building would be reduced by \$200,000, the original estimated cost being over a million dollars. The theater is being built by an association of lovers of the drama, and will be the home of a company of actors which will make artistic productions of really worthy plays without thought of financial returns.

## TWO JAPANESE ARRESTED AT FORT STEVENS, OR.

Portland, Or., Jan. 21.—A special to the Oregonian from Fort Stevens, Or., says:

Much consternation was caused today by the capture of two Japanese who were found loitering in the west battery of Fort Stevens.

The sentry while walking his post to the west battery suddenly came upon two Japanese who were walking upon the parapet of the battery. As this place is rarely visited except by special permission from the district artillery commander, the sentry hid behind a sentry box and watched their movements. Feeling them point to the different guns and emplacements, and looking over the situation in general the sentry took them into custody and marched them back to the main post. They were then interviewed by the district adjutant, Louis R. H. Kerfoot, who could obtain no satisfactory explanation of their trespassing.

Although nothing of an incriminating nature could be found upon their persons, indications are that they were at the post for the purpose of obtaining plans and sketches of the different fortifications and modes of defense.

The Japanese were very well dressed and seemed to be above the average in appearance and intelligence. The fact of their being in the west battery, probably the most important battery at the river's mouth, makes the situation more serious than it would otherwise be. The battery consists of six 10-inch rifles and two 8-inch rapid fire guns, and is considered to be one of the most potent factors in the defense of this part of the coast.

Unofficial intelligence was received some time ago relative to the surreptitious work of Japanese spies, but practically nothing was thought of as recently, when the various reports of the many instances of the Japanese obtaining plans, etc., of the different

coast defenses of the United States were received. No action of an official nature has yet been taken, but an investigation will probably result, and if the evidence tends to show that there is anything in the suspicious complications are likely to arise.
