Idaho's Capital Chosen as the Place of Meeting of the National Irrigation Congress in 1906

GRATITUDE TO THE OGDEN CHOIR

Beet Sugar Industry Favored—Statehood for New Mexico, Oklahoma and Indian Territory Indorsed.

Portland, Or., Aug. 24.—Boise, Ida., was chosen as the place of meeting of the National Irrigation Congress in 1906.

The smoldering contest which has been evident since the day the congress convened between the small landowners and large landed proprietors broke forth furiously simultaneously with the reading of the report of the committee on resolutions. A motion to adopt the report was followed by the introduction of an amendment to a resolution indorsing the present reclamation law, especially those provisions which afford an opportunity for home-making. This amendment advocated a repeal of that portion of the national irrigation law which compels the disposal of any acreage in excess of 160 acres in the possession of one landholder. The motion was bitterly attacked by the supporters of the small landholders, and after a spirited debate the amendment was defeated and the report was adopted as presented.

In substance the resolutions adopted by the congress follow:

Indorsement of statehood for the territory of New Mexico and for Indian Territory for Oklahoma and Indian Territory.

The congress believes that too much capital, public and private, has been invested in the reclamation of arid lands, and therefore declares that the government should not unnecessarily interfere with or restrict any enterprise from building reservoirs and other works for reclaiming arid lands.

In order to encourage beet sugar production in the United States, the congress asserts its opposition to the granting of further concessions to tropical islands. The resolution advocates federal legislation in behalf of the industry.

It is the opinion of the congress that the national irrigation law should be so extended as to include the state of Texas within its provisions.

A confusion said to exist in the minds of many people on the subject, the congress declares that there is not, nor has there been, any connection whatever between the National Irrigation congress and the National Irrigation association. It announces that no person or company is authorized to collect money in behalf of the congress.

The congress favors the early reclamation of small tracts of land, whenever the cost per acre of reclamation does not exceed the cost per acre of larger enterprises of similar character.

The federal congress is urged to enact such laws as will enable the national government to exercise the rights of eminent domain when necessary to carry out the purposes of the national irrigation law.

The congress indorses the effective and businesslike administration of the forestry bureau, the efficiency of the work of the reclamation service, but recommends that the reclamation service and its representative co-operate with state officers in matters affecting the state's landed interests. The resolutions indorse the work of the experiment stations of the department of agriculture and the United States weather bureau for its assistance to the reclamation service.

The congress expresses a high appreciation of the present national irrigation law, commends especially its beneficent provisions for home-making, and urges the speedy completion of the present government projects now under construction.

In order to remedy the unsatisfactory provisions of the constitution of the congress, which compels it to conduct its deliberations in sectional meetings, the constitution was amended to provide for a general session each day during the convention of the congress, but the congress may, if it deems best, also conduct sectional meetings.

The chairman of the nomination committee, to which was referred the matter of the selection of a committee for a secretary, announced that his committee had finally unanimously agreed on Mr. Maxon. A spontaneous attempt to defeat Mr. Maxon was nipped in the bud and the committee's report, as submitted, was adopted.

The reports of the chairman of the different sections were submitted and with an expression of gratitude to the citizens of Ogden, who sent their "Mormon" choir of 225 voices to Portland in honor of the congress, the thirteenth annual session became an event of the past.

The congress vigorously expressed disapproval of the injection of undesirable foreign immigration into its deliberations, contending that this subject is one in which the congress, as a body, is not interested.

No stone was left unturned by the supporters of this move to secure from the congress a declaration on the subject. It was the first resolution offered on the opening day and while President Packer's gravel was in the air, in the act of adjourning the congress today, a final unsuccessful effort was made to get the subject before the congress.

The executive committee of the National Irrigation congress today elected Monte B. Gwynne of Boise, Ida., chairman, and W. T. Booth of the same city, secretary. H. B. Maxon, secretary of the congress, also named Brothas as the assistant secretary of the congress.

Bloodshed in Costa Rica.

LOUEY POY KILLED.

Poy was walking through Ross alley when two Chinese stepped from a doorway, shot him in the back of the head and then fired two bullets into his prostrate body. Although only 28 years of age, Poy had been mixed up with a number of murder cases, and while arrested a number of times escaped through lack of evidence.

The team includes a number of the best association players in the United Kingdom, and is captained by Fred Milnes of Sheffield. Sir Charles Kinnaird, the Scotch baronet, is one of the members.

Popocatepetl May Erupt.

Mexico City, Aug. 24.—Prof. Elwell of Stanford university, who has been studying conditions of the crater of the volcano Popocatepetl, says that the removal of sulphur accumulated there during the past year probably brings on an eruption, on account of the water collected in the crater being brought into contact with a stratum of burning sulphur. The final result would be that the volcano would become active, as was the case under similar conditions with Mount Aetna.

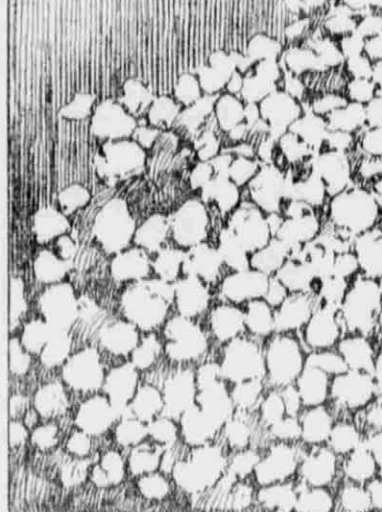
Children Lost in Swamp.

Essex, Mich., Aug. 24.—Huddled together with an open and dry spot only a few feet square, in the immense blueberry swamps north of this city, a searching party today found Mrs. J. A. Fisher, wife of Bernard Fisher, chief engineer of the Northwestern road, Mrs. B. J. Snow, wife of a Northwestern railway engineer, Arthur Snow, aged 12; Rosale Snow, aged 11; Miss Evelyn Doyle, aged 10, and a child of Mrs. Fisher, aged 1, who had become lost in the swamps. The party was camping and wanted blueberries for lunch. Leaving camp Wednesday, they struck out into the forest and lost their way. A special train with 30 searchers found the sextette of sufferers today four miles from camp, huddled into "No Man's Land," where no one has ever returned. Though badly scratched and completely prostrated, all of the members will recover.

The hydrangea shown in the cut is undoubtedly the largest single growth of its species in the world. PARIS IS AGOG WITH A SENSATION

Employee of a Bank With a Modest Salary Manipulated the Accounts in a Great Way.

GOT AWAY WITH MILLION FRANCS

Was on Best of Terms With a French Actress and Led a Very Merry Career.

New York, Aug. 25.—Paris is agog with a sensation such as it has not enjoyed since the Humbert case, says the Herald correspondent. Until the end of July Jean Galley was a punctilious employee of a great Paris bank, receiving the monthly salary of 300 francs, of which he maintained a wife and two children. At present he is said to be a fugitive aboard a lighted steam yacht, which left Las Palmas Aug. 3 for Buenos Ayres. Discoveries of clerical manipulations in the bank's books indicate an alleged shortage amounting to about \$200,000. Word was received yesterday by the police that the yacht had arrived at Bahia, Brazil, and the party aboard was under arrest. A man supposed to be Galley declared to the Bahia police that he was a Belgian, M. Hamard, chief of the Paris detective service immediately cabled to Bahia for further news and ordered the French detectives nearest Bahia to go immediately to that town and take possession of the prisoner as soon as the extradition formalities are accomplished.

For some months prior to his arrest, Galley, according to the police, had been on the best of terms with a well-known French actress, outside the bank he had sold to have used various high sounding titles and led a merry career. All this was learned during an investigation which began when Galley failed to return from his vacation on the appointed day. Pursuing their chase, the detectives learned that the clerk had chartered a steam yacht and sailed from Havre with two women and a large supply of provisions. CONTINENTAL FINANCE CO.

Has Less Than Two Thousand With Which to Pay Creditors.

Chicago, Aug. 24.—Of the funds of the Continental Finance company only \$12,126 remains to meet the demands of its creditors. This condition of affairs is a result of a report made yesterday to the circuit court by the Western Trust & Savings bank, the receiver. The receiver of this company, which was a complete wreck of the \$250,000 corporation under attack by the attorney general in court, has been paid from the company's assets. It is expected the creditors will get whatever is left after the expenses of the receivership have been paid from the \$12,126 collected. CLOUDBURST DOES IMMENSE DAMAGE

Trinidad, Colo., Aug. 24.—A cloudburst in the vicinity of Rhode canyon, through which ordinarily a small stream of water runs, converted the canyon into a raging torrent tonight, which swept through the towns of Berwind and Tobacco, wrecking everything in its path and drowning at least nine persons.

The property loss is estimated at hundreds of thousands of dollars, suffered mostly by the Colorado Fuel and Iron company and the Colby and Southern Railway company. The former company had mines and coke ovens scattered all along between the two mining towns of Berwind and Tobacco, and although the property was situated mostly out of reach of the flood, the highways connecting the different properties of the company were completely wrecked and the loss in this particular will be immense. The railroad company had a line running up the canyon and the roadbed was nearly completely washed away.

It is impossible to get accurate news of the loss of life and property tonight, for the reason that communication with the stricken towns is constantly being interrupted by the storm, which still continues. Relief parties have gone from this city and neighboring towns, but have been unable to reach several hours, as the 16 miles of distance lying between is deluged.

From all directions are coming reports of the disastrous effects of the storm, which enveloped Trinidad and the territory adjacent for miles, but no further loss of life than at Berwind and Tobacco has yet been reported.
