INCREASE IN RECEIPTS.

Sheriff's Office Shows Substantia

Gain Over Preceding Year.

The receipts of the office of Sheriff

C. Frank Emery greatly increased in 1907, according to his annual report

submitted to the county commission-ers yesterday. The report shows in-cense collections of \$26,500 in liquor II-

censes and \$4,869.63 from butchers and

censes and \$4,869.63 from butchers and merchants, a gain of \$8,376.98. In 1907 \$1,700.40 of 1906 fees were collected, The sheriff also shows that during the year he cared for 751 prisoners, \$15 being charged with felonies and the remaining 436 for misdemennors. Of the prisoners 50 were sentenced

the remaining 486 for misdemeanors. Of the prisoners, 50 were sentenced to serve terms in the state prison, 63 were committed to the industrial school, 188 remained in the county jail, and 66 were committed to the state mental hospital for treatment. The first license collections to be made by the sheriff's office were un-dertaken under the new law last year. Formerly the county commissioners had supervision of the work. The bet-ter administration of the license collec-

ter administration of the license collec-tions under the new law is pointe-out by the sheriff in his report.

out by the sheriff in his report. The report shows that the sheriff's office costs the county about \$30,000 a year to maintain. The fees from the office amounted to \$38,045.30 for last

The realty men at yesterday afternoon's meeting decided to work dur-Has not consolidated, but has ren ing the coming year for a reduction of water rentals to a rate sufficient to maintain the service, pay the interest on the water bonds, and to create a sinking fund to pay off the bonded indebtedness. Heretofore the water department had been made to make up the deficiencies of other city de-partments, and this was held to be ordered to a service of the rentals partments, and this was held to be unjust. It was claimed that the rentals should be reduced to a sum that paid no interest at all on the investment, but which merely paid the actual ex-pense. A petition will be prepared by the association and presented to the council asking that rates be re-duced Another proposition considered was to erect arches across the streets at the new Union passenger stations when the latter were built, as is done in Denver, and some other citles. Sign when the latter works built, as its done in Denver, and some other cities. Sign board advertising along railroad rights of way, outside the city, was also sug-gested. In a short speech following hig re-election to the chairmanship, E. F. Coiborn called attention to the fact that real estate agents have very lit-tle to do in the collection of rents, and those who did, were compelled to charge what was demanded by prop-erty owners. He claimed, however, that local rentals were no higher than they should be in order to meet tax-ation, necessary expenses of mainten-ance, and pay a fair return on the money invested. Before adjournment, the association decided to push the public street conveniences idea, which has already been explained to the pub-lic.

eat, and west. "The locators in nearly all cases not being surveyors cannot be expect-ed to make their claims conform to legal subdivisions either in size or di-rector of lines and the set of directon of lines, and they do not do

"The result of these erroneous lo cations will be litigation or violence, or both as the ground becomes more valuable, unless the government inter-

or both, as the ground becomes more valuable, unless the government inter-venes in time and extends its surveys over the land in question. "The oil bet being wide and ex-tending apparently in a northeast and southwest direction, covers all of Washington, the west half of Kane, the western part of Garfield and east-ern part of Iron counties. Utah, and as petroleum locations will soon he made over the entire oil region, I. like many others who have visited the field, am of the opinion that it is ad-visable for the government to extend the public land surveys over all the unsurveyed land in the region outlined above and so recommend. "Day by day locations are being made as nearly according to law as the locators are able, but still in such manner as to leave opening for dis-pute and it is to be hoped Congress and the department of the interior will intervene in time to prevent the con-torieue of lines which he attends

and the department of the interior will intervene in time to prevent the con-fusion of lines which is always the prime cause of mining litigation." Register Thompson and Receiver Kaighn in discussing the matter and in laying the proposition before the general land office at Washington, say:

"His suggestion impresses us as of "His suggestion" impresses us as of grave importance and worthy of seri-ous consideration and prompt action. An early survey of the lands would, as he states, save a world of conten-tion, litigation and possibly bloodshed in contentions that will arise between locators of oil mining claims in the locativy indicated. It would facilitate the disposition of these lands by the government and benefit this state in as-sisting the development of an import-ant industry. "It is also probable that with the in-
