LOCAL BRIEFS.

Sophomore Ball—The University sophomore will give a dance tomorrow evening in the Museum building.

II With Typhoid—Mrs. J. H. Miller is seriously ill with typhoid fever, at her residence 575 west First North street.

Fine Aspergi Dressing—The final asphalt dressing is being laid today, on the west side of the Main street block between Fourth and Fifth South streets.

Water Comes High—Parties from Nevada say there are 5,000 feet of water in Goldfield, and that drinking water at some camp is selling for \$10 per barrel.

Settice Dividend—A 22 per cent dividend will be paid to the creditors of the late B. B. Scheitler, bankrupt, tomorrow, at 172 south West Temple street.

Harvest Entertainment—There will be a harvest entertainment in the sixteenth ward apartment hall this and tomorrow evenings, in aid of the ward fund.

Fire Derricks Now—A fifth derrick has been set up at the New House buildings, for transfer of heavy building materials from the wagons to the distributing hoists.

Budger Club to Meet—The Budger club will meet tonight in the old Mendenhall hall opposite the Dooly block, where a social will be held. An audience of people are invited.

Poll Tax Soon Due—The 27 year old tax will be due Nov. 22. It is estimated all of working men will pay the tax, amounting to \$100,000, the costs making the bill for each delinquent \$4 additional.

Retires from Wales—William V. Price, the architect, has retired from three years' service in Wales, his native birth which he had not visited before for over half a century.

Has Crushed Foot—Sister T. Ward, a railroad employee at Milford, was brought to the Holy Cross hospital in this city yesterday afternoon with a crushed foot. He was hit with a ledge hammer.

Maud Powell Tonight—Maud Powell, the noted violinist, plays this evening in the First Congregational church, where a large audience will no doubt greet her.

May be Lower Prices—Local cattle men report the situation here as very quiet, with little doing. This makes plenty of room for home consumption, with prospective lowering in prices.

To Illuminate the Grounds—Ornamental lamp posts are to be set up in the tabernacle grounds, equipped with incandescent lamps like those in front of the "News" and Z. C. M. I. buildings.

Advocates Town—Sey Parkes of the Real Estate association has prepared rubber stamps by which the mottoes of the association may be stamped upon correspondence, thus more effectively advertising the town.

Customs Business Light—The Salt Lake custom house is doing a light business the most part of the time, with other months owing to the time of year. The principal imports are: Barbary hops, linoleum, curios, chinaware, etc. The latter articles are being brought in by individuals.

Elevator Breaks Loose—The controlling wires of one of the Dooly block elevators broke yesterday afternoon, causing the cage, with half a dozen passengers, to drop three stories at the bottom of the shaft, and descend upward rapidly. The passengers were terrified, but fortunately the cage stuck at the sixth floor, and the occupants escaped into the hall. No one was hurt.

Fraudulent Draft—The local banks received notice this week from the Pinkerton agencies that a fraudulent exchange draft on New York has been gotten out in their names. The draft was on the "National Bank of New York," which was worthless, because the proper name is "National City Bank of New York." This slight though effectively invalidating change would not be noticed in many, if not most cases, where use of the paper was attempted.

THREE PERSONS ADJUDGED INSANE

Stanich Mesich, Slayer of Fellow Austrian Has Developed Hallucinations.

THINKS EVERYONE HIS ENEMY

Negro Who Slashed Himself With Glass Says Mrs. Voss Has Designs On His Life—Jackman Third.

Three persons were yesterday afternoon adjudged to be insane, after examinations presided over by Judge George G. Armstrong, and were committed to the state mental hospital at Provo.

The first case considered was that of Stanich Mesich, an Austrian, who since June 10, has been confined in the county jail awaiting trial on a charge of killing a fellow countryman named Herman Obrazdovich. Since September he has shown strong symptoms of insanity, eating but little and laboring under the hallucination that every one is his enemy and bent upon doing him injury. Mesich shot down the man who ran away with his wife. The officers went to Nevada, but returned to Salt Lake, and the first time he met the despoiler of his home, Mesich killed him.

George G. Armstrong, and were committed to the state mental hospital at Provo.

The second case considered was that of William Jackman, who came to Utah not long ago from California.
