SIX MINOR CLUBS CAN'T HURT CUBS.

CAN'T HURT CUBS.

A Chicago dispatch says:
Charles W. Murphy, president of the world's champion Cubs, believes that his attitude regarding the proposed invasion of the North Side by the American association has been misunderstood. He says he has no fear of the result of competition between his club and the minor league and explains that his statements bearing on the talk of invasion were simply to show his loyalty to the National league.

"I know that half a dozen minor league outhts cannot hurt the Cubs," says Mr. Murphy, "but I felt that I had to say something to satisfy the other National league clubs. It appears to me that the statement that there is only local opposition to the invasion of the minors is misleading, as every club in the American league voted against the American association coming here, and, of course, remaining with the organized baseball.

"Something over a year ago I tried to arrange matters so that Watkins of Indianopolis could play Sunday games at the West Side park when the cubs were away. Brush, Herrmann and Dreyfus did not like this plan and preached to me on territorial rights, saying that this territory belonged to the major leagues as a whole."

President Murphy's statement shows conclusively that so far as he peronally is concerned he is indifferent to the invasion of the minors and his attitude really strengthens their cause. It had been generally believed from Mr. Murphy's earlier announcements that he felt bitterly toward the association, but this interview dispels any such flusions.

Since Comiskey is willing that the minors locate on the North Side and now that Murphy has set himself right and shown his indifference to the proposed invasion it may be that other major league magnates will feel that they have no good reason for denying admission to the American association should that body formally petition the majors for permission to locate a club on the North Side.
