KILLED IN SNOWSLIDE.

Former Well Known Resident of Bear Lake Meets Death in Wyoming.

The deceased had many relatives in Utah, Idaho and Wyoming. and his immediate family consist of a wife and ten children. A sister, Miss Rac V. Lindsay, is a nurse in the family of John A. Bagley, 1446 Thir-teenth East. Dr. T. B. Beatty, secretary of the state board of health, declared that he is opposed to the closing of schools as a general proposition. In explanation he said: "Although I recognie that in the public schools is found a frequent source of the spread of these diseases, the schools, generally speaking, should not be closed when proper precaution-ary measures would accomplish the same results. The best way, when it can be accomplished, is to use meas-ures that will prevent danger while the pupils continue their attendance at school. In the first place, if the people will be conscientious in detaining from school all children showing symptoms of illness of any sort, and then, if each teacher will make it a point to satisfy herself that no pupil in attendance is suffering with illness of any kind, or if he is, will immediately send such pupil home, the same result can be accomplished. The result of such ac-tion on, the part of teachers and par-ents, if carried out in the right way, would be the prevention of the occur-rence of much of the disease. "I do not believe that all of the chil-dren of the city should be deprived of educational advantages because of the neglect or carelessness of a few people. Quarantine regulations should be en-forced strictly and this would not oe necesary. "Tersons suffering from diphtheria Dr. T. B. Beatty, secretary of the state board of health, declared that he

necessary. "Persons suffering from diphtheria should remain isolated even longer than the law requires," said Dr. Beatty. "There are many mild cases of diph-theria that are never quarantined be-cause of a wish to avoid the expense and inconvenience incidential to isolatcause of a wish to avoid the expense and inconvenience incidental to isolat-ing the patient, and those who have been directly exposed to the disease. Although these cases may be slight on account of the powers of resistance of the patient, it may be transmitted to others and the later cases may be of the most malignant and dangerous type. It is the mild cases of diph-theria that invariably cause the most trouble by exposing others. No person having diphtheria should mingle with others until a bacteriological culture examination has been made showing no gerons of the disease remaining in the throat of the patient." throat of the patient."

NO NEED FOR PROLONGATIONS.

Dr. M. R. Stewart, city health com-missioner, says that he does not believe conditions at present */arrant the pro-longing of the holiday vacation. He advocates strict compliance with the quarantine provisions by both physi-cians and people generally as an ex-cellent way to check the spread of the disease. disease.
