### TINTIC MINES ARE DOING WELL

New Company to Develop Ground  
Near the Gemini and Bullion-Bell.

LEASERS MAKING GOOD MONEY

Fine Seam of Water in the Uncle Sam  
—Improvements at Eagle &  
Blue Bell.

Eureka, Utah, July 20.—The completion of the articles of incorporation of the Tintic King Mining company has been announced by Atty. Edward Pike of this city. The property of the company consists of about 5 acres of patented ground lying north of the celebrated Gemini and Bullion-Bell mines, being located in the richest portion of Tintic's great mineral belt, and in the territory in which a large amount of development work is about to be commenced. Lee Hopper, a man of 15 years' experience in the mines and prospects of Tintic and owner of several valuable properties will have charge of the development work of the Tintic King ground. The officers of the company are Dr. W. R. Pike of Provo, president; Lee Hopper, vice president, and Edward Pike, secretary.

From the lease on the dump of the Eureka Hill mine, Messrs. John T. Hopper, William Hall and David Smith have 130 tons of gold ore ready for shipment, and they now have a force of men at work clearing away the waste so as to reach the old dump which was taken from the lower tunnel of the mine before the hoisting works were erected. The latter are said to be in full course, and of good value.

The lease in the Eureka Hill mine held by Messrs. Bowen, Tite Mills and Dennis has proved to be very productive and they have shipped a carload of ore this week and will try and make regular weekly shipments. T. J. Brumley has also a splendid lease in the same property and is uncovering some rich ore.

#### WATER FOR UNCLE SAM.

A water seam has been cut on the 600-level of the Uncle Sam mine, which will supply the mine, which has heretofore drawn on the mill for its supply of water. The management of the mine recommended to allow visitors to inspect the underground workings of the property and S. C. Griggs will take pleasure in showing the riches of the property to all who desire to go through.

Carpenters are busy erecting the ore house and tramway at the Eagle and Blue Bell mine, which will be ready for use by the time the R. G. W. Ry has been switch finished to that property. The switch tramway which will connect the Eagle and Blue Bell will be 200 feet in length. A vein of water is being sunk in the mine to add another connection between the 800 and 1,000 foot levels, and drifting is being pushed on the 1,000 foot level.

The matter of having a mill to handle the low-grade ores of the Godiva mine has been about settled and the process of getting it in operation before the close of the year. Capt. Jackson McChrystal of the Godiva and Gemini mines returned this week from Nevada where he went to inspect the mill at the Tip Top mine and in all probability the mill will be brought to Eureka (all except the stamps) and rebuilt on the Godiva ground.

#### ON THE EXCHANGE.

Week Was One of the Best in Many Months.

The week closed on the exchange with a record of 161,701 shares sold, for which buyers paid the next little sum of \$47,093.11. Uncle Sam and Lower Mammoth were the features, although other stocks contributed liberally to the business done, notably New York, Yankee Cons., May Day and Silver Shield. May Day was again in good demand and when a half was called for the week, the market was firm, pressuring good business for days to come.

Today's call was the most active of the week, the record being 25,262 shares for \$6,547.38. Lower Mammoth was the leader, the stock starting at 51¢ and settling up to 59¢ with an additional figure of 100 shares added. In all 6,200 shares changed hands, while the call closed with the stock standing at 58¢. Uncle Sam sold freely at yesterday's figures and closed strong with a bid of 41¢. May Day took part in the market, settling at 8¢ and 8½, while New York was selling at 54¢ and 55¢, and Butler-Liberal went to 84 and 85¢.

Bullfrog (Bullfrog Mining District), Nev., July 17.—This is a country of mining extraordinary. "Gold is where you find it," is the slogan of the prospector, but when it comes to a wily red fox unearthing a paying gold mine, the limit seems to have been reached. Yet this has really happened, and more than one man has already been made happy by Reynold's discovery.

Several months ago, a man was prospecting over the hills 10 miles west of here. His caissons were nearly dry and he was in bad need of water.
