New York, Dec. 14 .- The feature of the opening dealings in stocks was Amalgamated Copper, of which 6,209

shares sold at 65% to 66. The majority of stocks sold a fraction higher and there were large transfers of a number of stocks. General Electric jumped 4 points. Amalgamated Copper was unloaded freely until it touched 65, where t was supported. Selling also began in other quarters sugar losing 1½ and Anaconda about a point.
