A royal princess, King Edward's daughter, has fallen so desperately in love with an immensely wealthy young nobleman that she is ready to renounce rank, title and precedence to make him her lord.

Princess Victoria Patricia, of Connaught, so the story runs, became infatuated with the young Marquis of Anglesey whom she met at Princess Eva of Battenberg's coming-out ball in London last year. Princess Patricia, who will be 20 years old next St. Patrick's day, is the younger daughter of King Edward's only living brother.

The Marquis of Anglesey, who will come of age next April, will have an income of \$750,000 a year. For a while the marquis paid the princess marked attention. Then he fell deeply in love with Lady Ivy Gordon-Lennox, only daughter of Lord Algernon Gordon-Lennox.

Princess Patricia's affection for the marquis being unmistakable, her family made most discreet overtures to him. Anglesey tried to extricate himself by intimating that as a princess she is miserable and can be happy only as the Marchioness of Anglesey. And now, Anglesey's friends say, the Connaughts have let him know that the engagement to the princess would be announced becomingly on his 21st birthday.
