Editorial Despatch. President Taylor and party after viewing the Temple at Mantu, and giving such directions as appeared necessary, at one p. m. started for Ephraim, arriving at two o'clock. The Sanpete Stake Quarterly Conference convened at 10 a. m. At the meeting house, which was crowded, the congregation was addressed by Pres. Peterson, and Apostles Lyman and Smith.

The statistical report of the Stake was read. At the two o'clock meeting Pres. J. F. Smith, Elder C. W. Penrose and Pres. Taylor were the speakers.

Another meeting was held at 8.30 p. m., when Elders J. H. Smith, F. M. Lyman and C. W. Penrose spoke.

Thursday, Dec. 1. Morning cloudy and symptoms of storm. Conference convened at 10 a. m. After the usual opening services, Elder J. B. Maiben read the financial report of the Manti Temple for the past three months also from the commencement of the building to date.

The Cannon-Campbell Case.—In the Third District Court, in the case of the United States ex rel. A. G. Campbell vs. George Q. Cannon, defendant appeared, by his counsel, on Saturday afternoon, and moved to amend a journal entry and order heretofore made, so as to read as follows:

"The demurrer of the defendant to the complaint filed in this action having been heretofore argued by counsel for the respective parties, and taken under advisement, and the court having duly considered the same; and it appearing to the court that the Attorney General of the United States should file a complaint in behalf of the government in this case, and that from the facts stated in the complaint, there is no sufficient cause shown for annulling it; it is ordered that the said demurrer be and the same is hereby sustained, and that the complaint be, and is hereby dismissed."

The amendment proposed in the motion consists in the striking out of the entry and order of the following, which, being superfluous and untrue, was evidently introduced for effect:

"Which are admitted by defendant's demurrer, that there is no record of defendant's naturalization, and that no proceeding for that purpose ever took place in court, and that the certificate held by defendant is a certificate of naturalization was obtained by fraud and has been fraudulently used, and is void on its face in not professing to be the copy of a record and not certifying a regular naturalization."
