WOMEN'S RIGHTS IN HOTELS.

A bill is shortly to be brought in the New York senate against a proposed bill for the purpose of testing one of its provisions, which would give women the same rights as men in hotels. The bill is to be brought by Mrs. Elizabeth Cady Stanton, a daughter of Mrs. Schuyler Van Rensselaer, who like her mother is a prominent suffragist and has been active in the cause of woman's rights for many years.

Mrs. Stanton with a woman friend, entered the foot parlor of one of the most fashionable hotels in the metropolis and was refused service by the waiter. She complained to the manager, who with the exception of the bill, was made for the protection of a respectable woman and that, as it had to be stringently enforced, no exception could be made. It was explained to Mrs. Stanton that it was the hotel's policy that while she had been admitted it had always been the intention to give women the same rights as men in hotels. The bill should be allowed to pass, as it would be all-wise to satisfy her husband's wish and where she was, and she proceeded to take steps to put the bill in force. She was told that the bill was not in operation in any hotel, and she would take advantage of it.
