Each Day the Impression Made By the Morocco Incident Grows Deeper.

SPEECH AT TANCIER IRRITATES

The Paris Temps Says It Constitutes Almost Maximum Short of Openly Quarreling With France.

Paris, April 3 .- The Morocco incident is daily making a deeper impression, and while calmness continues to prevail, there is a growing sense of the rudeness of the shock which Emperor William's visit to Tangler and his declarations gave to the French policies. However, for the present it is evident that the purpose is to adopt a passive attitude and await the development of events. This was shown by a conference at the foreign office today between Foreign Minister Delcasse and several deputies who wished to question him in the chamber concerning Morocco. The net of the questions, saying there was nothing to add to what he had already stated in the senate. Accordingly the questions were indefinitely postponed.

The Temps tonight says the author-ities' version of Emperor William's re-marks at Tangier makes it useless to deny the disobliging character of such words, which "constitute almost the maximum short of openly quarreling with France that Emperor William II could attempt in order to be disagree-able."

However, the general tone of the press is singularly free from belliger-ent or menacing talk.

A LESSON TO FRANCE.

St. Petersburg, April 3.-The develop-ments resulting from EmperorWilliam's speech at Tangier Friday con inue to attract great discussion in the press and in diplomatic circles. The sober view is that the German emperor selz-ed on a favorable opportunity to read France a lesson for leaving Germany out of consideration in the French-Brit-ish understanding regarding Morocco, with the view possibly of compelling France to make a permanent renuncia-tion of her aspirations regarding Metz and Alsace-Lorraine, also with the practical purpose of securing a vote in the reichistag next fall for a larger na-val program. There is no serious idea that the incident may lead to a conflict. With Russia enfeebled France will have to look to Great Britain to play the role speech at Tangier Friday condinue to With Russia enfeebled France will have to look to Great Britain to play the role of protector assumed by Russia when Germany threatened her in 1875, and there is a good deal of speculation on the subpect of the new grouping of the powers. The home papers, however, declare that while the British press may bluster, Great Britain has had her quid pro quo in Egypt, and will leave France to take care of herself. OBJECT OF EMPEROR'S VISIT.

London, April 4.—The correspondent at Tangier of the Times asserts that the correct version of Emperor Wil-liam's conversation with representa-tives of the sultan of Morocco is as

follows: "The emperor declared that he had come expressly to Tangler to assert that he would maintain the absolute equality of German economic and com-merclai rights, and that he would not allow any power to obtain preferential advantages. The suitan, he said, was the free sovereign of a free country, and Germany would insist on always carrying on her affairs direct with him and would never allow any power to act as an intermediary.
