Nothing but Superlatives Can Describe Real Estate Transactions, Bauk Exchanges, Ry, Earnings, etc.

New York, Oct. 6-Dun's Weekly Review of Trade tomorrow will say: Favorable trade reports still predominate and there is no anxiety regarding the future. Higher temperature checked retail distribution of heavy wearing apparel and other seasonable merchandlas, but preparations

for unprecedented fall and winter trade continue without diminution. Superlatives are needed in commenting on real estate transactions, building permits, bank, exchanges and railway earnings, and failure statistics for the third quarter show a very low death

The curious structure herewith illustrated has stood for twenty years as an unfinished monument to man's credulity in matters of religious belief. He died suidenly, and the sect went to picces. Now the building is to be torn down and replaced by a business structure.

A GREEK ORTHODOX CATHEDRAL MADE OF JUNK.

VARICOCELE.



The peculiar structure shown in the picture is the cathedral of Archbishe Serafim at Winnipeg. That prelate built it with his own hands, unsided by any workman of any kind. Realizing that an archbishop without a cathedral was like a ship without a rudder. Scrafin collected a mass of junk of all sorts and proceeded to fashion one of the most wonderfully constructed buildings ever seen in any civilized country. The sides and ends are of flotsam timber, and it is put together with scrap iron. The roof is of tin most laboriously patched together. There is even a chime of rusty bells over the door, and there is some attempt at ornamentation. The lower of winnipes attempt at ornamentation. The irreverent and mischlevous boys of Winnipes have pulled it down once or twice, but the good Scrafim has restored it.

Serafim's flock is scattered and very poor, consisting for the most part of Russian peasants who have settled in the northwest and a few Orthodox families that have come down from the north.
