CINCINNATI, 5.—The democrats  
of the Third Ohio district, yesterday  
nominated Gen. J. Durbin Ward for  
Congress.

DETROIT, Mich., 5.—The republic-  
an convention of the Sixth district  
on the 24th ballot nominated Gen.  
O. L. Spaulding, for years special  
agent of the Treasury Department.

BOSTON, 5.—The democrats of the

NEW YORK, 5.—The republican  
conference was called to order by  
Ex-Governor Jewell, chairman of  
the National committee, who made  
an address and explained the object  
of the conference. He was followed

The following resolution was  
adopted:  
Resolved, That it was the sense of  
the meeting that the Southern  
States should be assisted whenever  
such assistance was demanded, and  
that the campaign should not be  
abandoned in any Southern State.

Secretary Sherman being called,

through the Southern States, be they  
white or black. When the republic-  
ans sent money and aid to India-

ern States. He would give to these  
southern districts the aid they  
needed, men, aid and money. He  
would not waste money where he

addresses were made and the confer-  
ence adjourned. General Garfield  
and Arthur did not attend the confer-  
ence.

Mining Business.  
The World says: Business was

Union Pacific railroads for transporta-  
tion.

Land Decision.  
Commissioner Williamson, of the  
General Land Office, to-day, render-  
ed a decision in the Kaweah Lime-  
stone Land case. The Commission-  
er has decided that lands valuable  
for the production of lime, and neces-  
sary to the construction of the  
Southern and Central Pacific and  
other subsidized and grant railroads,  
shall be reserved for the use of the  
Government. He directs that the ap-  
plication of applicant Jacobs, to enter  
the land in question lands be refused  
until the lands are reserved for the  
use of the Government.

Removal of Secretary Taylor.  
Congress at its last session, pro-  
vided for the remainder of the year's  
salary to the heirs of President  
Zachary Taylor.
