Mr. Hagen-barth paid \$50,000 for the option, says Dame Rumor, and his original intention was to buy the mine if the reports made upon it were substantiated by the experts he selected to examine the property. Among other things the re-port said. \$2,000,000 worth of ore was blocked out in the mine to the 600-foot level. The Amalgamated wanted the mine, it is said, but the Sait Lake man, to use a term of the pit, "beat them to if". It is hinted that the surrender of the option did not come as a result of any unsatisfactory showing in the mine, but because someone wanted the mine bally enough to pay a handsome difference to Mr. Hagenbarth.
