



An Inhuman Outrage.

DUBLIN, 16.—Following is the particulars of the attack on Farmer Galvin at Castle Island, Kerry Co., Saturday night.

Shortly after 8 o'clock, five disguised men entered the victim's house and found Galvin, his mother, wife and two servants at home. The visitors were armed with muskets, pistols and had white handkerchiefs tied across their faces. One tall fellow advanced into the room, and asked Galvin if he had paid his rent. Galvin replied in the affirmative, adding all his neighbors had done the same. The leader then asked him if he preferred to have his rent cut off by half. Galvin said he had only one life and would prefer death to mortification. The unfortunate man was then directed to kneel on the floor. The leader cried out, "Take aim; fire," and Galvin fell to the floor, striking on his face. The attacking party then began beating the fallen man with the butts of their guns. The mother threw herself upon her son to save him. One gun was broken by the heavy blows.

Territorial Wealth and Prosperity.

LONDON, 16.—John Walter, of the Times, in speaking in Berkshire on the result of his tour in America, says it is evident that there are no English countries a body of men able to advise their neighbors who are about to go to America. Any Englishman going to America who is a good judge of land and who is steady and industrious, might be certain of becoming wealthy and prosperous before he was fifty years old, and before the close of the next century the United States would have 100,000,000 people.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 16.—The Porte is informed that representatives of English and German philanthropists are endeavoring to promote the emigration of Jews to Turkey, the intention being to establish a colony of Jews in Anatolia, Peterburg and Bucharest, that Jews be allowed to establish themselves in separate communities in all parts of the empire, especially in Palestine.

Baltimore, 16.—John Mitchell, from merchant, failed.

Hannibal Hamlin, wife and Miss Blaine have arrived at Liverpool on their way to Madrid.

The Clark House, the chief hotel in Duluth, Minn., was burned. Loss \$50,000; insurance \$2,500.

The Arabs who retired before the expedition to Karawan, are now ravaging the undefended points on the coast.

Five thousand people are dying daily in Mecca from cholera. Steamers at Jeddah refuse to embark returning pilgrims.

A Washington dispatch says Controller Knox has ordered an assessment of 100 per cent. upon the shareholders of the Newark bank.

The sub-commission of the Land Court at Limerick made the following reductions in rents to-day: £63 reduced to £42, £40 to £25, £49 to £20.

It is said the Princess Louise accompanied the Marquis of Lorne to Canada five weeks hence. The Marquis resigns the Governor-Generalship early in 1882.

Gambetta has sent a circular note to the representatives of France abroad, stating that a change of ministry will not modify the pacific tendency of the foreign policy of France.

Flags are generally displayed in triumphal arches erected in many places in St. Rochdale, in honor of John Bright's seventieth birthday. Congratulatory addresses were presented him.

A Marseilles dispatch says: Numerous embankments for Tumis will commence this week. The steamship company has been ordered to prepare for the transportation of 5,000 soldiers to Algeria.

A London dispatch says: D. Carter died because of unseemly wrangle on the occasion of his recent election, which he matched with Archer on other grounds, his matches there are off including one for £1,000 with Stuart Worley, unless some other place is selected.

A peculiar case of somnambulism.

A case of somnambulism which according to the statements furnished to the Herald, would appear to be worthy of expert investigation, is that of a little boy of 14, Martin, by name. The boy, the son of a tinsmith, is a total idler, and has no social as well as in any first-class hotel.

Approaching the fact that forty of the boys in the dormitory of the tinsmith's shop, are all sleepwalkers, and that the boy is a habitual offender, he was sent to a school for delinquent boys, and the parents of the boy were compelled to pay £100 a month for his board.

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
