HOW FORESTS ARE GROWN. Seeds are planted in April to best advantage, but as they were late in getting started last year, those planted getting started last year, those planted in July are doing well. When two years old the little pines are set out in developing beds about one foot apart from which beds a year later they go to the forest. Over 1,000 trans-plants came from Fort Bayard, N. M., and were set out on the northeast slopes, scattered about in the forest. Of these, not to exceed 4½ per cent have failed to set and do well. The Mt. Graham national forestry contains approximately 18,600 acres, and is comprised of country surround-ing Mount Graham. This mountain stands out almost alone in this open country and is 12 miles wide by fully 20 miles long.

#### BEAUTIFUL SURROUNDINGS.

Utah, with his wife Ella Cluff Birduo and family, is local-ed at Camp Inception, as deputy forest ranger, and has general charge of the field work and the nursery. Mr. George Birduo, whose home has been in the Gila valley for 23 years, has been in this service for over a year now and has worked his way up to the responsible position he now occupies. GUARD SAFE IN NEW YORK. New York, June 2.—Capt. J. Koch-leader of the famous Finnish red guard, the revolutionary militia of Fin-land, although searched for by the secret police of Russia and all Europe, has arrived safely and is staying with ariends on the East Side, says the World today. There is a price of many thousand rubles on his head but Capt. Koch declares that he will con-tinue his work for the liberation of Finland; that uprisings greater and more terrible than those of the past will confront the Russian government. The Finnish red guard consists of 10,000 men erid 5,000 women all armed with the latest model Mauser rifles, well drilled and capable of being mobilized at a moment's notice. In an interview Capt. Koch gives high praise to the women in the fight-ing organization. He said: "The best soldiers in my army were the women. #### INTERNATIONAL ISSUE TURKEY MISSION. OVER A DESERTER.

Washington, June 3 .- Col. Henry A. Greene of the Tenth infantry, commanding at Fort William H. Seward, Alaska, has appealed to the war de-Alaska, has appealed to the war de-partment to cause the arrest and re-turn of a deserter, and incidentally to punish the captain of a British ship who, perhaps, has created an interna-tional issue. According to Col. Greene, Sergt, Buell, a member of the post band, deserted from Fort Seward and went on board the British steamer, Princess May, When the ship touched at Ketchikan, Alaska, May 14, the city marshal, under instructions from the military authorities, sought to arrest nilitary authorities, sought to arrest

military authorities, sought to arrest Buell. The latter locked himself in his cabin and the captain of the ship refused to allow him to be forcibly arrested and sailed away to a Canadian port, where the deserter landed and disappeared. Col. Greene asks the war department to ask the state department to make a fequisition upon the British govern-ment for the return of the deserter to Fort Seward, and for the punishment of the captain. The acting judge advo-cate general, however, has taken the ground that the military has no such authority, and if the effort is made to punish the British captain it must be through the civil authorities who were derelict in the first place in not arresting both the deserter and the captain if he resisted process within territorial waters. captain if he rest territorial waters.
