CONVICTED.—It will be seen, by the letter, of Bro. McEwan, clerk of the 1st Judicial District Court, published in today's paper, that, at a session of that court held in Provo on Thursday last, the young men Monroe and Tatum, arrested some time since for abstracting money from the mails in the Southern portion of the Territory, have been sentenced, the former to three, the latter to two, years in the Penitentiary.

FINE EARLY POTATOES.—Elder James Funtling, of the 20th Ward, brought to the office this morning a specimen of early potatoes raised by him this season on a lot on the East Bench. They are of the Ash-leaved Kidney variety, and were planted the last of March.

CONGRESSMAN ASSAULTED.—Congressman Porter, of Virginia, was assaulted in Richmond by a man of the name of Patrick Woods. The latter was arrested and brought to Washington, where he was examined before the House Judiciary Committee. Woods says he was intoxicated at the time of the assault, and was not in a condition to know whether he was striking a Congressman or any other man. He says that Porter came up to him and asked him if he knew who he (Porter) was. Woods replied that he did not, and that "he didn't care a damn." Mr. Porter then said, "I am Porter, a member of Congress." Woods thought he said something about his getting drunk on porter, and regarding the language as offensive, he struck him. The New York *Herald*, in commenting on the case, says that anybody would have felt aggravated at being told that he had got drunk on porter and Congress water; and adds:

"Pat, being a hot-blooded Irishman, rather willing than otherwise to fight even on mistaken premises, promptly and effectually knocked the Congressman down for what he supposed to be an imputation on his drinking capacities. This is all there is of it, according to Pat's version (and Congressman Porter's version does not much improve it), and yet the House persists in making a democratic martyr of Pat and putting the high inducements of fame and good lodging before every muscular god-carrier in the South who finds a lucky opportunity to knock down a carpet-bagger. Congressman. Why couldn't Porter have risen in his tracks and knocked Pat down? It would have saved money to the country and told better for Porter than the present investigation does."
