LOCAL BRIEFS.

Will Meet Tomorrow.—The regular meeting of the Salt Lake County Horticultural society will be held tomorrow afternoon at 1 o'clock in room 256 at the City and County building.

Scandinavian Reunion.—A Scandinavian reunion will be held in the Granite state tabernacle on Sunday, June 17, at 2 o'clock p. m. The choir of the Salt Lake Elks will furnish the singing.

Will Locate at Roundful.—Dr. Horace C. Holbrook, the young medical student whose graduation and likeness were printed in last Saturday's News, will locate in Roundful, Davis county, instead of at Provo.

Fine Recital.—Miss Berneice Carlson's pupils gave an interesting piano recital last evening, at the Ladies' Literary club, Miss Edith Godde assisting with vocal numbers and Miss Edna Edwards acting as accompanist.

For Irrigation.—The Timpianogus Irrigation company of Heber City has filed application with the state engineers for 16,000 acre feet from Shingle creek, and 5,000 acre feet from Beaver Creek to irrigate 18,000 acres in the valley north of Provo.

New Candy Company.—Articles of incorporation of R. Elie Candy company of this city have been filed in the county clerk's office. The capital stock of the company is \$20,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$1 each. Robert Elie is president; R. S. Ashurst, vice president; Lizette Elie, secretary and treasurer.

Child Buried Today.—Norman Nelson, the 2-year-old child who fell into a tub of scalding water Tuesday, was buried this afternoon from No. 4 Mortenson court. The sorrowing mother is the object of much sympathy, as her husband deserted her six months before the child was born, and she has since been obliged to eke out a meager existence by washing to support herself and children.

Dr. Murphy Home.—Arthur J. Murphy has returned from New York after graduation from Belknap medical college with the degree of doctor of medicine. Dr. Murphy will spend the summer with his folks here, and return in the fall to New York, as interne in the City hospital. He graduated from the Salt Lake high school in 1901, and was one of the "Original Callahan Kids."

Grafter Arrested.—Officer Ben Slegus arrested a man named Redman, yesterday afternoon at the Rio Grande depot, and he was booked at the police station on a charge of vagrancy. Redman poses as a strong-arm man, and is believed by the police to have been responsible for at least some of the sand-bagging attacks that were made some months ago. He was, when arrested, outfitted with a grafter's equipment.
