The mother of the child came out of the house immediately after the said occurrence, and was almost frantic with grief at the sight which met her Raze.

The car on that line has for some time been operated by one man, who acted both as motorman and conductor, and at the time of the accident he was in the car collecting the fares and let-ting the car run itself. He felt the car pass over some obstruction, and hastening to stop the car be saw the bleeding form of the child on the track.

There were many expressions indignation that a company, holding a franchise under the city, should be allowed to operate in such a manner, regardless of the safety of human life. T. C. Armstrong, the motorman-con-

ductor, was taken into custody to await the result of the investigation, but was afterwards released by Justice Smith until today.

Armstrong was greatly affected and said he had dreaded to run the car alone, as he had to leave the car to run itself, while he went inside to collect fares. Before going inside he looked abead but could see no children close to the track. The children have been in the habit of running in front of the car, and it was only the day previous that the car had been stopped to allow the same child to get off of the track. It is considered almost miraculous that accidents have not resulted before.

NICARAGUA REPLIES.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—It is reliably stated that Nicaragua has replied to Great Britain's ultimatum. It is in the nature of a counter proposal and not a direct acceptance or rejection

of the British demands, and as such it is not yet known whether Great Britain will accept it as responsive to the ultimatum which made three demande:

First-A money indemnity of£15,000 sterling for alleged personal injuries to British subjects, including British Consul Hateb.

Second-The revocation of the declaration of banishment against British subjects.

Third-The formation of a commission to decide by arhitration the damage done to property of British subjects expelled from Nicaragua.

The ultimatum contained no limit of time, but in a subsequent note the Earl of Kimberly stated that an anthe ultimatum would swer ito pected within seven weeks of February 26. The seven weeks are up tomorrow.

Nicaragua's answer is in two parts. To the second demand it says that Nicaragua even before receiving the British communication had revoked To the the decree of banishments. first and third demands, the answer is that in order to preserve friendly relations with her majesty's government and with the purpose of tairness and justice, Nicaragua proposes that all questions of payment for personal injuries, injury to property, etc., be re-terred to an impartial commission of rerred an impartial commission of arbitration. The foregoing is re-garded as a most diplomatic answer. It concedes Nicaragua's willingness to adjust the differences, arbitration. and yet, courteously suggests that the 15,000 pounds demand is ex parte estimates and that the whole question of the amount of damages should be left to arbitration. Great Britain's answer to the counter proposition is awaited with interest, but Nicaragua's reply is that it is beso pacific in character lieved the subject has ceased to have a warlike aspect and that diplomacy will adjust the remaining details.
