

## FORTIFICATION OF THE SEA COAST

It Will Take Sixteen Million Dollars to Complete the Engineering Work Under Endicott Plans.

APPROPRIATED \$28,963,434

Defense of the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence River is Under Consideration.

Washington, Nov. 5.—Sixteen million dollars will be necessary to complete the engineering work of the fortification of the seacoast of the United States under the present plans of the Endicott board, according to the report of Brig.-Gen. Mckensie, chief of engineers. There already has been appropriated for this purpose \$28,963,434. Permanent projects at 31 different points have been adopted and most of them are well under way. Among these points are San Diego, Calif.; San Francisco, Columbia river, and Puget Sound.

The defense of the great lakes and the St. Lawrence river is under consideration. The estimate for the completion of the fortifications does not contemplate anything more than the projects outlined by the Endicott board. Modern appliances and additional fortifications developed by the army and it is anticipated that the cost of actual construction will probably largely exceed the above sum when such development is completed.

While the general principles of the fire control system have been satisfactorily determined and adopted, the final details on which much largely depends are still in a condition of uncertainty, development by the artillery and it is anticipated that the cost of actual construction will probably largely exceed the above sum when such development is completed.

Work has been progressing on the fortifications for the defense of Manila bay and Subic bay and on the purchase of sites for fortifications in Hawaii. A tract on the Columbia river and one on Puget sound were acquired during the year. The amount set aside for fortification works under the engineering department for the fiscal year 1907 amount to \$14,424,152, divided as follows:

San Pedro harbor, Cal., \$30,000; mouth of Columbia river, \$300,000; Honolulu harbor, Hawaii, \$200,000; Washington harbor, Cal., \$100,000; Oakland, Cal., harbor, \$250,000; San Pedro bay, California, \$41,000; Columbia river, at The Dalles, Ore., \$25,000; Columbia river, between Vancouver, Wash., and the Willamette river, Oregon, \$30,000; Columbia and lower Willamette rivers, below Portland, \$125,000.

### ONE SHOT, FOUR STABBED.

Poles and Russians Have Row Over Conditions in Russia.

Chicago, Nov. 5.—One man was shot and fatally injured, and four other persons were stabbed in a fight here yesterday, brought about by a discussion of the present revolutionary conditions in Russia. The men who were Poles and Russians, because involved in an argument in a saloon over the merits of the czar's manifesto and the constitutional government which has been promised two of the most democratic countries in Europe and the others declared that some selfish medicine seller may have started the row as the only solution of the question. During the argument one of the Poles drew a revolver and commenced shooting. The first shot struck Frank Younghak in the abdomen, and as the wounded man fell to the floor the others intervened and became involved in a general fight. Three of the men were armed with knives and the fourth with a revolver. The noise of the shooting attracted two policemen, who hurried to the scene, and before they could separate the combatants, one of them had been severely cut and stabbed. All of the rioters with the exception of Younghak will recover.

Cash Payments Cause Run on Bank

Chicago, Nov. 6.—Cash payments of wages in Indiana harbor frightened the employees in the factories there so greatly last week that they started a run on the Indiana Harbor state bank. The financial storm raged for three days and the tempest was quieted solely by the sight of piles of currency and gold, which the bank officials placed in view of the ignorant foreigners who

were clamoring for their money. The run was at last checked, and nearly all the money that was drawn out has been redeposited.

The anomalous fight resulted from the fact that the Inland Steel company at the end of the previous week, on the regular payday paid in cash instead of following its old custom of giving the employees checks drawn on the bank.

This led to the conclusion that something was wrong with the bank, and the run ensued.
