LEGISLATIVE.
 Feb. 18, 1869.
 HOUSE.—At 2 p.m. the House resumed
 its session.
 The Committee on Roads, &c., reported
 "An act repealing an act entitled an act
 granting to H. S. Alexander the right to
 establish toll bridges across the Weber river
 in Summit county," which was passed.
 The special committee reported back "an
 act of incorporation for pecuniary profit,"
 amended; the amendments were adopted
 and the bill passed.
 A communication was received from His
 Excellency, Acting Governor Higgins, an-
 nouncing his approval of "An act pertain-
 ing to damage done by animals, and defin-
 ing a lawful fence," "An act repealing an
 act regulating estray pounds and for other
 purposes," "An act to provide for mechan-
 ics' and laborers' lien," "resolution ex-
 empting certain iron works from taxation,"
 and "memorials to the Hon. A. W. Randal,
 Postmaster General." His Excellency
 returned "memorial to Congress for an
 appropriation to defray the expenses of the
 Indian War in Utah Territory," stating his
 objections to the same.
 "An act providing rules for working
 mines, involving easements, drainage and
 other necessary developments," was taken
 up and passed.
 The Territorial appropriation bill was
 taken up, amended and passed.
 "An act to amend an act regulating the
 mode of procedure in criminal cases," was
 received from the Council, read and refer-
 red.
 "An act in relation to interest on money,"
 was received from the Council, read and refer-
 red.
 "An act supplementary to the act regulat-
 ing the mode of procedure in civil cases,
 &c.," was received from the Council amend-
 ed; the House did not concur in the amend-
 ments.
 The committee on Elections reported the
 following officers to be elected by the joint
 vote of the Assembly:
 One Chancellor and three Regents of the
 University.
 One Attorney General.
 One Probate Judge, one Notary Public
 for Pi-Ute county.
 One Probate Judge, one Notary Public of
 Iron county.
 One Probate Judge, one Notary Public of
 Sevier county.
 The Council were requested to meet the
 House in joint session, for the election of
 the foregoing officers, to-morrow at eleven
 a. m.
 A message was received from the Council
 announcing their concurrence in the time
 appointed for the joint session to-morrow.
 Adjourned till to-morrow at ten a. m.
 Feb. 18; 7 p. m.
 HOUSE.—House met—quorum present.
 The report of the Lieutenant General of
 the Nauvoo Legion was read and ordered
 printed.
 The sum of \$3,500 was ordered inserted in
 the appropriation bill for the Adjutant Gen-
 eral's office.
 Mr. Rich presented "An act relating to
 fugitives from justice," read and referred.
 The Council announced their passage of
 the act providing for the incorporation of
 railroad companies and the management of
 the affairs thereof, with amendments; in
 which the House concurred.
 The Council announced their non-concur-
 rence in the House amendments to the act
 to amend an act prescribing the manner of
 assessing and collecting Territorial and
 county taxes.
 The act dividing the Territory into road
 districts was returned by the Council amend-
 ed. The title was amended to read: "An act
 for the protection of the public thorough-
 fares."
 The committee on the Library were in-
 structed to bring in a bill, further defining
 the duties of the Librarian, &c.
 The bill for an act to amend an act regulat-
 ing the mode of procedure in criminal
 cases was reported back and passed.
 House adjourned till to-morrow at ten
 a. m.
 Feb. 19.
 House met at ten a. m.
 Mr. Midgley presented a petition of Wm.
 Price and twenty-one others, citizens of
 Utah and Juab counties, asking for an ap-
 propriation for road purposes; read and re-
 ferred.
 Mr. Rockwood reported that Nichols and
 Godbe had paid their per centage to the
 school fund on amount collected on their
 toll bridge across Bear River, in Box Elder
 county, and on the bridge across the Malad
 and submitted vouchers; also that the We-
 ber Canyon Road Company had not com-
 plied with the terms of their charter in re-
 lation to the School Fund, nor in relation
 to making a report to the Assembly. The
 report of the committee was adopted.
 The Council and House met in joint ses-
 sion.
 The committee on the Library brought in
 a bill, defining further the duties of Libra-
 rian, &c., which was passed.
 The committee on Judiciary reported
 back a substitute bill, entitled an act to
 amend an act in relation to interest, approv-
 ed Feb. 14th, 1868, and recommended the
 passage of the same.
 Said bill passed its three readings.
 Recess until two p.m.
 House resumed its sitting.
 The Council announced that they did not
