A Runaway Outfit.

At 10 o'clock this afternoon a large herd of horses, attached to an empty phaeton, dashed into the head of Main street, between 1st and 2nd. An Attempt to Kill.

On Friday last, Smithfield was the scene of great excitement. Alma Raymond was arrested by Deputy Conroy on the charge of assault with a loaded rifle upon Hyrum Hilliard. He is a son of the former member of the Legislature of Oregon and placed under \$500 bail to appear for examination in the commoner's court, Wednesday next.

The trial originated in a game of cards in which four persons of Smithfield participated. A dispute arose between the defendant and one of his card partners, which led to the shooting of the cards.

Angry words followed and someone proposed that they fight it out. Raymond agreed that he would fight if Hilliard would do the same. "What are your weapons?" asked Hilliard. And Raymond replied, "A pistol." After this was said, Raymond went to three different places and finally succeeded in securing a house rifle, returning to where the cards were playing, and, armed with the rifle, walked into the yard, when thinking "all was up" with him, jumped at Raymond, and with the sound of others succeeded in wresting the gun from his hands. COURT CASES.

The People vs. Society in the Third District—Other Business.

ASSAULT TO MURDER.

The case of the People vs. William J. Society, charged with assault with intent to commit murder, occupied the entire time of the Third District Court this morning. The offense is alleged to have been committed on the 10th of last August, at North Hall Lake, the defendant having with a revolver shot three times at Thomas H. Hall, with the intention of killing him. A jury was quickly impaneled and several witnesses were examined on both sides, the evidence, taken all in, at 12:25, at which time the court recessed till 1 p.m.

At 2 p.m. the arguments were commenced and were in progress as the News went to press.
