#### FOREIGN.

Paris.—The Empress will depart for the East on the 2d of October. The Emperor presided at a council of the

Ministers to-day.

London.—The Times, in an article on the Byron story, says that Mrs. Stowe admits that she consulted with Lady Byron only, on the expediency of publishing the true accounts of the separation, and owns that she dissuaded her from doing so; but she omits to produce adequate authority for her statement, and whatever may be behind the revelation, she was wrong in publishing information supplied only, to obtain her opinion as to what action should be taken upon it. M. Schessinger, in a letter to Cologne, states that Wentworth repeatedly assured him Lady Byron deserved the unhappy story of her marriage to die with her, and that the family papers contained no secret.

Thomas John Penn, the last descendant of the William Penn family is dead. Havana.—The Captain General has issued an order, changing the name of

the town of Los Tunas, to Victoria Los Tunas, in commemoration of the recent Spanish victory over the rebels at that place.

SanFrancisco, 19.—There was an earthquake throughout Northern Arizona, on the 5th inst.; no damage. London.-Henry Phillott, Bishop of

Exeter, died yesterday, aged 91. It is estimated that twenty vessels were wrecked and several hundred sea-

men injured in the late gales.

Madrid.—It is rumored that Napoleon has telegraphed the French Minister at Washington that France desires Cuba still to be retained by Spain. General Prim, it is said, has had a second interview with Napoleon. Lord Clarendon, the British Foreign Secretary, has also had another audience with the Emperor.

A decree, proclaiming liberty of worship in Cuba, will appear in the Official Gazette to-morrow. It is probable that Farraro or Romero will be sent to Cuba to resolve, on the spot, all questions of the Administration. The embarkation of reinfercements to Cuba has commenced. It is asserted Admiral Topete will command the fleet. The prospects of the Duke of Genoa, as candidate for the throne, are improving. His marriage with the daughter of Duke Montpensier is proposed.

Paris.—Gen. Prim has left on his return to Madrid, where he will arrive on Monday. The weather is stormy today.

Baron Von Beust, the Austrian Prime

Minister, is expected here.

City of Mexico, 10; Havana, 13.-A preliminary meeting of Congress was held on the 8th inst. Senor Montez, Speaker of the Supreme Court, has probably reversed the decision of the Guerrero State Courts, taxing the Pacific steamship company, a proceeding which favorably affects the New York and Mexican line, heretofore taxed at Sisal.

A revolution in Puebla is feared. Velez, who arranged for the betrayal of Maximilian with Lopez, has been appointed Governor of this district. Opposition to the government is said to have become furious lately, owing to the shooting of Lieutenant Vanquez and two sergeants, who conspired to capture the conducta, which contained treasure; disturbances are anticipated. Protestantism is making rapid strides at Gueno.

The villany of the court judges has become so serious that several have been removed.

## Correspondence.

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 29th, 1869.

Editor Evening News:-Dear Sir.-I sympathized with "Anonymous," in Saturday's paper, when complaining of what he calls abuses in our Theatre. After reading it I thought, as the subject was broached, I would say a few words upon the subject and with "Anonymous" express my dislike to these infractions of etiquette and good breeding.

It is no unusual thing to be accidently seated (unless you pick your company) beside or near parties who are freely indulging in cracking nuts, eating candy, etc., etc., in such a disagreeable Chinn W H manner as to detract from the pleasure which the entertainment would natur-

ally afford; if not these annoyances the attention of all around may be drawn to some gentleman with unusually creaking boots, who seems desirous to become an object of interest; or worse still, a sensation caucus in which critcisms of the performance sufficiently loud for all around to hear are pronounced.

Those young ladies and gentlemen on the west should remember that although their services may be very highly appreciated by patrons and managers while on the stage, the disturbances they often create after they enter the Auditorium are not as polished as their costume (which they have just doffed) might lead one to expect.

Now, sir, I think if one or two doorkeepers and some of the supernumeraries were to pay strict attention to the intellectual portions of the drama, they might discover lessons in manners and etiquette there, which if adopted would very much elevate them in the esteem of society. I regard the Legitimate Drama as a very powerful engine (in the hands of artists, not showmen) for imparting instruction in such a manner to all classes, that none can take offense; and all have the privilege of adopting gems of sentiment, thought and refinement there enunciated.

Since the erection of the Salt Lake Theatre, of which I have been a regular attendant, I have noticed a rapid growth of politeness, especially among the younger portion of our community; but the mission of the drama in this respect is not ended amongst us, and in my opinion the School and the Drama can be equally as successful as the Pulpit in imparting lessons to the young. Not that I depreciate the pulpit, but the young must have a little fun; pulpit instruction is of a durable and solider type than is relished generally by the young folks. Some old sage has said:

"A little nonsense now and then Is relished by the best of men."

Our citizens have been favored with the revival of the Legitimate of late in such a classic, masterly and powerful manner, that it has gained fresh converts, some of which have left the school of sensation with disgust. All that the press has said concerning the great renditions of Mr. Neil Warner I consider him fully entitled to; he is deserving the highest compliment as an artist, and I only regret that through scarcity of money many appreciative members of the community are debarred the privilege of witnessing his enactments.

Mr. Managers, success to you in your stick-and-hang-itiveness. Be encouraged, times are improving, the Treasurer will discover it, and we will pass many an evening with you in the winter, and see the parties I have referred to improved in deportment. Fellowcitizens of the Stock Company be rather more energetic; play with more "vim." You need not be afraid, it is only Stars that can outstrip you now; but keep improving.


