



## HOW FLYNN LOST TO JACK ROOT.

Referee Otto Floto Gives His Version of the Contest Last Thursday.

SAYS THE COUNT WAS PROPER.

Gives Much Praise to Flynn for His Splendid Showing Against Former Champion of Light Heavies.

When Jimmy Flynn, formerly a Salt Lake fighter, went down to defeat before Jack Root, formerly champion of light heavyweights, in their battle last Thursday night, there was a great roar among the spectators, many of whom believed that Referee Otto Floto did not give Flynn a square deal in using the word "out" for the tenth count. Now Floto comes back with the declaration that the count was proper, and that the word "out" should be used instead of saying "Ten, out." Here is what Floto has to say about the fight: Jack Root defeated Jim Flynn of Pueblo in eight rounds at the Rover Athletic Club. Not, however, until Flynn had offered the toughest kind of resistance and had fought a very close and hard battle. Flynn surely proved a surprise to the writer and there is no use in denying the fact that he will be heard of in the future. Under the able handling of Johnny Mosconi he has risen to the top of the pugilistic ladder he is rapid.

From start to finish he gave Root his hands full and while the Chicago man undoubtedly has a great reputation he did not scare the Pueblo fighter, who held himself well together, was cool and steady at all times until he received the knockout. Root made prominent use of his left hook for the face, but half the time it lacked steam. "He fought just such a battle as he did against Gardner," he seemed to be unable to untrack himself and overbalanced himself time and again when he tried with the left," is the manner in which his manager, Lou Houseman, explained the battle. Houseman is quite taken with Flynn and also predicts that he will make his mark in pugilism with proper care and handling. He lacks proper judgment of distance. Time and again when he led with his left, had he gone inside of Root's guard he might have brought about results favorable to himself. Then, too, he swings wildly. In a mix-up in the fifth round he was exchanging blows for blows with his opponent, but in stepping into the close quarters he just managed to back out of distance and therefore his efforts were in vain. These small details can be remedied, however, with a little skillful coaching. In the eighth round Root chopped him a short right to the chin in close quarters and brought him down. I then began to count him using the word out instead of ten, which is absolutely proper. recuperate, which is a violation of the Queensbury code. Flynn was on one knee when I said "out," this is "down" and lost him the fight.

As not one in 10 who were present seemed to understand the rules, owing to the manner in which they have been discredited by local referees, there was a demonstration after the battle, but it all ended happily, and the report in a morning paper that I was rotten-egged is in keeping with the same article which called Flynn a light weight.

Johnny Kenny, Jim Wilson and in fact all the Denver contingent who were present and witnessed the "real count," agreed that the decision was absolutely fair. "If you hadn't given that decision," said Lou Houseman, "it would have been an injustice to Root, as well as myself. I am surprised at the objection raised and believe when it is carefully analyzed those present regret the objection they made at the time."

I have no hard feeling against any of the spectators who disagreed with me, with the exception of officer Fred Dally and I meet on neutral ground some day.

**CORBETT COMES NEXT.**

He is the Man Old Bob Fitzsimmons is Now After.

Although James J. Corbett and Bob Fitzsimmons are not yet matched to meet in the ring, it is more than likely that they will come together within another year. Both Corbett and Fitzsimmons have expressed a desire to clinch a match, but the date and the terms of battle have by no means been decided upon.

When Corbett and Fitzsimmons are ready to fight they will have no difficulty in finding a battle ground. In fact, the "clubs" are already after the match and it will rest with the clubs to say when the match will take place.

Since Fitz has disposed of Gardner, he has announced his willingness to meet Corbett in a roped arena, but Corbett has not yet agreed to be in a very great hurry about a match with Ruby Robert. He has engaged himself on the stage until next May, doing his monologue stunt and making good money at it. He says that he would be willing to sign up for a match with Fitz to take place in October. In speaking of the matter recently Corbett said:

"I know that everybody wants to see Fitzsimmons and myself come together. None is more anxious to have the match take place, however, than myself. I have a pretty good memory, and I have been waiting a long time to even up that score at Carson City."

When I fight Fitzsimmons it will not be for fun, but to give a good beating and get all the money possible out of my victory. With me it is simply a business proposition. I know that we would draw considerable money and I don't intend to allow the club to draw it all, as they have done in the past. I am satisfied that I am the drawing card in Frisco. When I fought Jeffries our match drew twice as much money as any of Jeffries' other matches on the coast. Still I only got a small sum.

"As for my fight with Fitzsimmons, there is one reason in particular that I am anxious to meet him at this time is because I believe there is one more good fight in me. I have completely recovered from my fight with Jeffries and I am going into active training, and I believe that a couple of months' hard work will put me in grand shape. If I am in as good condition as I was when I met Jeffries I don't think there will be anything to it. Why, if I had Fitz in the ring with me that night I don't think he would have kept five rounds. I was right, but the game was too strong."

San Francisco, Dec. 1.—After gaining a neck victory in the fourth race at Oakland today, Forest King was disqualified for fouling near the finish and placed last. He interfered with Last Knight, the favorite, who was given first money. There were a number of exciting finishes. Favorite followers fared badly as only two first choices landed. Horton took the closing race, which was run in a dense fog. Hildebrand was suspended for the remainder of the week for rough riding on Forest King, while Ferrell was given a similar punishment for cutting across the field at the start with Captain Forces. **KID CARTER LOST.**

Fifteen Round Contest in Which Marvin Hart is Victorious.

Boston, Dec. 1.—After a hard-fought contest, Marvin Hart of Louisville was given the decision over Kid Carter of Brooklyn in a 15-round bout at the Criterion Athletic Club tonight. The fight was stopped by referee Buckley within one minute of the time limit, and when Carter was nearly out. The first two rounds were very close. In the third, Hart poured Carter with a right, but the Kid, after taking the count, got up and clinched. From that time until the ninth both men fought savagely, Hart having the better of the battle.

Carter was knocked down several times, but Hart's blows seemed to lack force and the Brooklyn boy always arose before the 10 seconds expired. In the ninth, Carter drove a hard left at Hart's face, making a big cut over the Kentuckian's left eye, which bled freely. Hart was dazed, but managed to continue the round.

During the next four rounds the men went at it hard and fast. Hart scoring the most points, and Carter being knocked down repeatedly. The Brooklyn boy boxed pluckily, occasionally landing some terrific right-hand punches that made Hart stagger. The fourteenth round was a savage one. Carter reopened Hart's eye and the latter landed a wicked left on Carter's nose. Carter was very groggy and was finally knocked down, but the going rang before he could be counted out.

In the fifteenth both contestants went in to win, but Carter was so plainly outclassed that the referee stopped the fight after two minutes of savage boxing, during which Carter was knocked down twice.

**PANAMA AND GERMANY.**

The Kaiser Wishes New Republic Success and Prosperity.

Washington, Dec. 1.—In his letter to Minister Bunau-Varilla, formally naming him the recognition of the republic of Panama as a sovereign state by the German government, Baron von Den Busch-Haddenhausen, the charge d'affaires of the German Embassy here, concluded:

"The government of his majesty expresses the most sincere wishes for the prosperity and success of the new republic, and hopes that friendly relations will always exist between it and the German empire."

Minister Bunau-Varilla in his acknowledgment of the communication from the German government said:

"The gracious and kind expression you have given of the good will of the government of his imperial and royal majesty, the emperor and king, will not fail to touch the hearts of the government and people of Panama."

"I wish that the first pronounced sentiment at the beginning of the official relations between the empire of Germany and the republic of Panama shall convey to your government, in the name mine, our ardent wish for the prompt recovery of the precious health of his majesty, the emperor and king, and the people of Panama to join in the expression of this sentiment with all those who admire his wise, humane, pacifying and therefore Christian and civilizing policy."

**MAYOR OF THE DEATH HOUSE**

Albert T. Patrick is Elected to That Dishonorable Place.

New York, Dec. 2.—Albert T. Patrick, an inmate of Sing Sing prison, where he has been for some time under sentence of death for the murder of William Marsh Rice the aged Texas millionaire, whose property he is alleged to have coveted, has been elected "mayor" of the death house. He already has served nearly a year in that important office.

Patrick has nine companions but one refused to vote. Being a lawyer he prepared his own case for the court of appeals, and has added the condemned man in their efforts to secure new trials. All questions of importance are referred to him, and he passes upon them just as a city magistrate would under other circumstances. Patrick thanked his fellows for the faith they had in him and assured them that he would try the rule with fairness and to their entire satisfaction.

The connected prisoners are not permitted to visit one another. Each exercises in his own cell and is taken out but once a week. Therefore, the powers of the mayor are great. If two of the inmates want to play checkers it is necessary for all the others to be quiet. This and questions of a similar nature, invariably are decided by the mayor.

**A REAR-END COLLISION.**

One Man Killed and Six Seriously Injured.

New York, Dec. 2.—One man has been killed while six received serious injuries in a rear-end collision on the Newark branch of the Erie railroad at Westnutley, N. J., seven miles from Newark. A heavily loaded milk train crashed into a freight on the West Nutley siding, wrecking both trains and tearing up the track for a distance of 100 yards. The milk train was running 40 miles an hour. The engineer of the milk train was torn to pieces and every man in the crews of the two trains was hurt. Fifteen minutes before the milk train was due at West Nutley a heavy freight from Jersey City had arrived. The locomotive and three freight cars had just passed on the siding, when the milk train rushed down on them. The noise of

the collision brought a crowd in the village and they made slow work of rescuing the injured trainmen, owing to the darkness. Three were able to crawl from the debris unaided. It is not known if the others will recover.

**WILL BEAT THE WORLD.**

Carnegie Ready to Make His Technological Schools Best of All.

Pittsburg, Dec. 1.—Arthur A. Hemmerich, director of the new technological schools now building, returned from New York today. He announced officially that in addition to the endowment of \$2,000,000 and the money furnished by Andrew Carnegie to defray the cost of buildings, Mr. Carnegie is willing to do much more. He authorized Mr. Hemmerich to say for him that "if the people of Pittsburg want them I am ready to make (technical) schools the largest and strongest in the world. It remains for the people to say by their appreciation how large the schools shall be and the question of expense is not to come into the matter." The possibilities opened up by this offer, Director Hemmerich says, are almost beyond conception.

**Fencing in of Public Lands.**

Omaha, Neb., Dec. 1.—The alleged illegal fencing of several millions of acres of government land by extensive cattle owners and ranchmen of western Nebraska occupied the attention of the federal grand jury today. Several prominent men, among them state and United States officials, are said to be among those whose cases are under investigation. Although not officially given out, it is stated that one extensive cattle owner, and a leader in the movement to keep fences standing, has already been indicted. The court, however, refuses to make public the indictment until arrests have been made.

For several months the government has been collecting evidence against illegal fencing, which is being laid before the grand jury.

**Military Prisoners Escape.**

San Francisco, Dec. 1.—Military Prisoners Toeh and Sarham, from Alcatraz island escaped from Fort Mason during the heavy fog this morning. They have been brought over to work on a road, but made a dash for liberty. The guards fired at them, but so far as known they were not hit.

**Imprisoned for Illegal Voting.**

Berlin, Dec. 1.—Joseph Herzfeld, a Social Democratic member of the Reichstag from Bostock, Mecklenburg, was condemned to a short term of imprisonment in Berlin today for voting twice at the recent elections.

**Fred Douglas's Widow Dead.**

Washington, Dec. 1.—Helen Douglas, widow of the late Frederick Douglas, the negro orator, died here today, aged 65 years. Mrs. Douglas was the second wife of Frederick Douglas, and was a white woman.

**To be Secretary of Hawaii.**

Washington, Dec. 1.—The president today sent the nomination to the senate of A. T. L. Atcheson of Hawaii, to be secretary of Hawaii.

**More Anti Smoot Petitions.**

Washington, Dec. 1.—The senate was in open session 30 minutes today. After receiving a number of bills, resolutions and petitions, and after spending some time in executive session, adjournment until Friday was taken. A majority of the bills offered were for private pensions, and most of the petitions for the expulsion of Mr. Smoot (Rep., Utah).

As usual, Mr. Cullom (Rep., Ill.) called up the Cuban reciprocity bill, but as no one manifested a desire to ad-

dress the senate upon it, the bill went over.

**Very Rich Gold Strikes.**

Topeka, Kan., Dec. 1.—W. J. Black, general passenger agent of the Santa Fe, has just received a message from the agent at Lincoln, N. M., advising him that the recent gold strikes on the west side of Caballo mountains are even richer than indicated by first reports. The gold fields run from the banks of the Rio Grande river back to the mountains, making it the greatest placer field ever located. A stage line has been started between Lincoln and the gold fields. Grocery and outfitting stores busy with the needs of the miners, and the crowds of gold-seekers pouring in are being well taken care of.

As the Santa Fe agent made an inspection of the locality, his report is based on his personal knowledge of existing conditions. It is anticipated that the crowds will be greatly increased as soon as the existence of these fields of gold becomes better known.

**Nordenskjold at Buenos Ayres.**

Buenos Ayres, Dec. 1.—The Argentine gunboat Uruguay, with Dr. Otto Nordenskjold and the members of his antarctic expedition arrived here today and will enter the harbor tomorrow afternoon. A great celebration in honor of Dr. Nordenskjold and his party is in preparation.

**Charged with Raising a Check.**

New York, Dec. 2.—Robert Campbell, said to be a graft merchant, has been arrested on charge of forgery involving a loan of \$5,000. The complainant is George Dresser, a broker, who charges Campbell with raising a check of \$5,000 of the American Smelting and Refining company from one share to 50 shares, and the forged check, procured for him a loan for the sum named.

**Garnett Held for Murder.**

San Francisco, Dec. 1.—Alexander Garnett was today charged by a coroner's jury with the murder of Max J. W. McClung at the Palace hotel on Nov. 25. In the police court Garnett pleaded not guilty, and his preliminary examination was set for next Thursday.

**Surprise for Humbert Creditors.**

Paris, Dec. 1.—Creditors of the Humbert family at a meeting today received a pleasant surprise in the form of jewels valued at \$1,000 which were found in a matchbox on the person of Romaine Daurignac when he was searched at the Fresnes prison. It is not known how Daurignac contrived to conceal the jewels during his long detention.

**Ex-Commodore Brown Dead.**

New York, Dec. 2.—Edward M. Brown, former commodore of the New York Yacht club and for many years well known at the fruit commission trade here, is dead at the age of 61. He became a member of the New York Yacht club in 1877 and had owned many fast steam and sailing vessels.

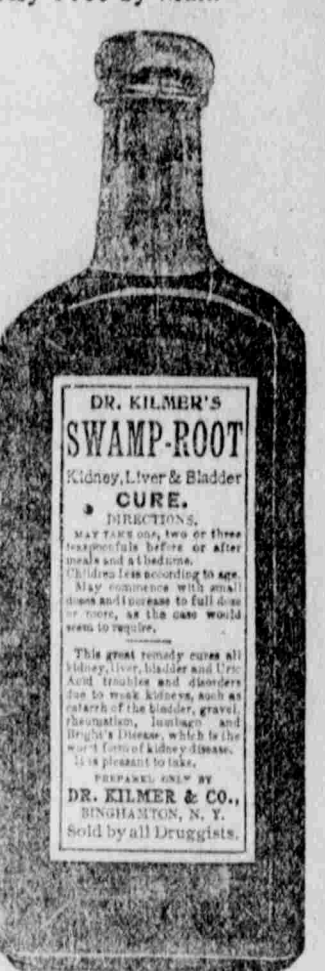
