Carnegie Ready to Make His Technological Schools Best of All.

Pittsburg, Dec. 1.—Arthur A. Hem-merschlag, director of the new tech-nological schools now building, re-turned from New York today. He an-nounces officially that in addition to the endowment of \$2,000,000 and the money furnished by Andrew Carnegie to defray the cost of buildings, Mr, Carnegie is willing to do much more. He authorized Mr. Hemmerschlag to say for him that "If the people of Pitta-burg want them I am ready to make the technical schools the largest and the technical schools the largest and strongest in the world. It remains for the people to say by their appreciation how large the schools shall be and the question of expense is not to come into the matter."
