Logan, Sept. 14.—At the last meeting of the general committee held at headquarters at 7:30 p. m., Sept. 13, 1903, the following business was done:

Chairman, Lorenzo Hansen, Hon. Joseph Howell, W. J. Kerr and Joseph Jensen were present.

A letter from President Linford, asking that arrangements for visiting the Brigham Young college be made, was read.

Ordered that arrangements for visiting the Brigham Young college be made if time will permit.

Chairman Hansen reported that the Wellesville land had tendered their service for the occasion.

Moved by Joseph Jensen that the tender be accepted, and the band be invited.

Joseph Howell reported that the finance committee were at work; a list was in circulation and he thought the necessary funds would be forthcoming.

Moved by President J. W. Kerr that all purchases by any member shall be made by requisition previously approved by the Chairman of his committee.

Ordered that the President Kerr be authorized to purchase souvenir cards for the visitors on the occasion, and a register for all who expect to come so they may register their names while the congress is in session.

Ordered that a special invitation be tendered our U. S. senators and state officials.

Ordered that the matter of the marshal of the day, duties and messengers be referred to Secretary Bullen.

Ordered that Professor J. A. Whitson be appointed chairman of a special committee with right to select aids to receive guests at the Agricultural college.
