JUVENILE COURT BILLS IN HOUSE

Important Matters Being Considered by Judiciary Com-

CONSTITUTIONALITY SOUGHT.

Prors in Present System Will be Rectified by Measures Now Being Gone Over,

Among the bills yet to be considered by the legislature of general interest to the people of the state, are the juvenile court measures now pending in the house Representative E. C. Ashton ingroduced several measures the effect of which was to place the juvenile court jurisprudence of the state on a plane of constitutionality and effectiveness. The sudiciary committe has had those measures under consideration for some time, and as stated in these columns saturday two of the measured or Mr Ashton were adopted by the committee, one was killed and a substitute decided upon. The substitute bill places the matter of handling juvenile courts in the hands of the county commissioners in the respective countries. When the matter was presented to the house, the report of the committee was adopted and the bill goes on the calcular. The provisions of the substitute bill are as follows:


