Improvements—New Settlers—Crop
Prosperous.
PLYMOUTH CITY,
Box Elder Co., May 30th, 1875.

Editor Deseret News—

The increasing wealth and spreading advancement of material improvement are raising us to an equal standard with other and earlier settled localities. Among the latest strides is the erection of a store, well filled and containing a variety unequalled in northern Utah. It is kept by H. D. Persons & Son. We have also made an application for a post office, which we expect to have in a short time. As this would make the name of the place more commonly known, the citizens thought it would be more praiseworthy to have a different name, which was agreed upon at Plymouth City, instead of Square Town.

Besides many town lots that have been taken up and houses and other improvements erected, we have all around us new comers, who are taking up land and settling, many sanguine of success in farming without irrigation. The fall wheat in this locality affords ample encouragement, for without a drop of water there is a fine prospect for a good harvest. The grain in this settlement looks splendid, the fall grain being in the boot, and crops of all kinds look promising, and even this spring's grain will require but little if any irrigation. Mr. Shean & Son have located a whole R. R. section and have many thousand feet of lumber engaged for fencing and building, which they expect to do this summer. They intend to have, in grain, a good portion of it before snow flies. As I have said in other communications, this is a fine section of country, the soil rich and deep, averaging about two feet, and the greater portion susceptible of irrigation, if necessary. Hundreds of acres have been taken up this spring, and I would not jeopardize my reputation for truthfulness by saying that every acre of arable land will be claimed in a very short time and those who would not settle here and who would not give a "fig" for all the land around here will, like others who have been thus mistaken, have cause to regret their misstep. Grain can be raised here without irrigation, and it will be raised without it, and that in a short time. There is room for many yet and I can say with propriety that a better place cannot be recommended to those who wish homes in a healthy and beautiful section. I do not wish to impose my opinion upon the public without proof, but let the skeptical come and see, and to them my assertions will be verified.
