The decrease is mainly due to the fact of a very backward Spring in 1873, followed by continued dry weather during the summer months. Fortunately a much larger area of land was planted in 1873 than 1872, or the discrepancy would have been much greater. In Sanpete county the yield fell short about 33 per cent., in Tooele county about 17 per cent., at Spanish Fork there was no diminution, and in Cache county the products were a little over 20 per cent. more in 1873 than 1872. The crop of hay was 20,000 tons in excess, but the fall in price from \$16 to \$14 per ton precluded much increase in the total value. Barley, Oats and Indian Corn, it will also be observed, commanded less prices. It is worthy of note that Cache county is destined to become a great wheat-growing country. No less than 300,000 bushels were produced in 1873, nearly half of which was exported to California. The grain is of very superior quality, and eminently adapted for shipment to foreign countries. It is in contemplation to raise at least double the quantity during the present year (1874).

The production of coal was 28 per cent. more in 1873 than 1872, but the value having fallen \$1 per ton, the sum total is not proportionately increased. Granite was 185 per cent; Ice 50 per cent; Wool 16 per cent., but the latter having fallen from 43c. to 23c. per lb., the aggregate cash value is not so great. Tallow was 18 per cent. more. Hides and Pelts each 20 per cent more, and Dried Peaches were 31 per cent. less.

This branch of industry has increased, although figures show a decrease. The manufacture of Sorghum, which amounted to \$470,050 in 1872, has been almost abandoned. The item of Building Bricks shows an increase of 31 per cent. in 1873. Fire Bricks (a new industry) to the value

of \$42,500 were made in 1873. Boots and Shoes are less by 17 per cent. in 1873. Leather shows an increase of 43 per cent. in 1873. Woolen Goods 50 per cent. Lumber 33½ per cent. Furniture 67 per cent. Railroad Ties 87½ per cent. Fire Clay (a new industry) \$5,764 and Telegraph Poles \$15,150.

Assorted merchandise foots up \$1,594,125 more in 1872 than 1873, equal to 18 per cent.; this is attributable to the foresight of our Importers.

Lumber is 24 per cent. less in 1873 from the same cause; the stringency in the money market having checked the erection of new buildings. Coke, Charcoal and Bullion were not imported until 1873; they amount jointly to \$839,432. The importation of Iron Ore was increased 100 per cent. in 1873. Coal was 31½ more in the same year. Wagons were 19½ per cent. less in 1873 than 1872. Building Material was 181 per cent. more in 1873, owing to the importation of heavy iron castings for the Salt Lake City Gas Works, Hussey's new Bank and the Wasatch Hotel.

The following were in excess in 1873 over 1872. Machinery 31 per cent. Railroad material 33½ per cent. Furniture 46 per cent.

The importation of Indian Corn was 25 per cent. less in 1873 than 1872.

The export of Ore in 1873 was 35½ per cent. in excess of 1872. Base Bullion was 59 per cent in 1873 over 1872. Pure Lead nearly 3,000 per cent. in excess in 1873. Silver exceeded 230 per cent. in 1873. Gold was 48 per cent. more in 1873. A larger quantity of Wool was exported in 1873 than 1872, but in consequence of the depreciation in price from 43c. to 23c. per lb., the aggregate value was 62½ per cent. less. Hides exceeded 20 per cent. in 1873 over 1872, and Pelts likewise 20 per cent.

The export of Wheat and Barley in 1873 was \$143,332 of the former and \$50,000 of the latter, making an aggregate of \$193,332 against \$20,000 of Wheat in 1872. The quantity of Dried Peaches exported in 1873 was 21 per cent. less than 1872. Eggs, Butter and Poultry were 66½ per cent. more in 1873 than 1872.
