BY TELEGRAPH.

WASHINGTON, 19.—The President presented the Secretary of the Interior's response to the Senate resolution with information respecting the construction of railroads. He enclosed a report of the Commissioner of the Land Office, but says it is entirely impracticable to answer the resolution in detail at present.

Coke, from the Indian committee, reported allotting lands in severalty to Indians on various reservations, and to extend the protection of the laws of the States and Territories over the Indians and for other purposes.

The House adjournment resolution was referred to the committee on appropriations.

After the morning hour Butler spoke on the Kellogg case.

Bayard's deputy marshal bill was then considered.

Carpenter presented Edmunds' amendment offered last year to prevent intimidation, violence, etc., at elections and meetings.

Several other similar amendments were also rejected by party votes.

Teller offered an amendment making it unlawful for any Government officer to levy political assessments providing voluntary contributions may be made, also providing penalties for bribery, for intimidation, for going into any meeting, or for interfering with political meetings; rejected.

ADJOURNED.

WASHINGTON, May 19.—The agricultural appropriation bill passed and the House went into committee to consider the tariff bill.

Tucker objected to the funding bill being considered, and under the rule the committee rose and reported objection to the House.

The House refused to lay aside the funding bill in favor of the tariff bill, the vote being 99 to 91.

Rengan then introduced the funding bill with his later State com-
merce bill, agreed to, 88 to 50. After-
wards recess was taken.

Another Fixed Boat Race.

Hanlan has Another Walk Over.

WASHINGTON, May 19.—At 8:45 o'clock this evening the long de-
bated question was finally settled and
the great race was won by the title of
the Champion of America.

The great race, if it may be called a race, occupied just 30 minutes and
49-10 seconds, by the computation of
the official time keeper, through
three seconds less was returned by
parties upon the water.

At 3:15 p. m. the *Genoa*, having on
board the referee, Judge Charles
Kempster, several newspaper representa-
tives and a score or more of dis-
tinguished guests, including Secre-
tary Sherman, Thompson, Post-
master General Key, and ladies of
their families, drew up to the start-
ing point and immediately after the
second gun was fired a signal for
the men to get ready. Blackie
gave the cautionary "Are you
ready?" and three seconds after the
word, "Go," which sent the
men to the start. Courtney's
gun seemed to catch a trifle in
advance of his opponent, and with a
sturdy even grip upon the water
he shot his boat palpably to the
front. The *Genoa* had gained 18
feet, or about the size of 80 to 100
feet, before Courtney had over-
hauled him and had succeeded in
stroke to 30 and shook his head to
some one in the referee's boat who
had shouted to him to pull, saying,
"Pull, pull, pull, pull, pull, pull,
up, and pulling steadily at the stroke
to the minute, opened the gap as he
pleased. All interest in the race
was concentrated upon Courtney's
three-quarter flag fully 10 lengths in
advance. At the first mile he was
pulling 31 strokes to the minute
and Courtney's boat was just
about 28 and frequently casting a
despairing glance over his shoulder.
Soon after passing the mile flag
Courtney's boat was pulled up and
reached the starting line, dipped it
in the water and replaced it on his
head, repeating the operation a half
dozen times in the next mile.
His steering, which at the start was
faultless, became more and more
erratic, and three of the six flags
from the back water to the two mile
point were either brushed by his
oar or run directly by his boat.

Hanlan reached the two-mile flag
in 19 minutes and 49-10 seconds, just
one-eighth of a mile in advance of
Courtney, who finally stopped three-
quarters of a mile from the turn, or
two and one-eighth of a mile from
the start, turned his boat and pulled
desperately over the course and dis-
covered at his quarters at the Pot-
terson boat-house. Hanlan pulled on
to the turning mark and sailed away
for the finish in 17 minutes 44
seconds from the start. On his way
home Hanlan gradually overhauled
Courtney, and thousands on the
shore and on the boats and steam-
ers which lined the course, not
knowing that Courtney had not
turned the stake boat, imagined the
