A Bad Case.—A man named David Nichols, of Moroni, has been in a lamentable condition for nearly three months. Over eleven weeks since his foot was caught in the wheel of a moving carriage, into the spokes of which his leg was drawn and twisted, breaking it in three places. The leg was set by unskillful hands, the result being that it gradually got into a very bad state, the bone even protruding from a portion of the leg. A day or two since competent surgical assistance was procured from Nephi, and hopes are entertained that the limb of the unfortunate man may yet be saved.

Accidentally Hurt.—Yesterday evening Mrs. Barratt's horse to come unmanageable near the head of first East Street, and ran away. The vehicle collided with a telegraph pole a short distance from the Social Hall, and the lady and her son Samuel were both thrown violently out. Mrs. Barratt had her arm broken below the elbow and was badly bruised about the shoulder and one leg. Master Samuel was hurt on the side of his head and face, from which the skin was peeled off. Both were taken home, where they received immediate surgical attention. We are pleased to learn to-day that Mrs. Barratt is doing as well as could be expected, considering the nature of her injuries. A PROCLAMATION BY THE MAYOR.

Whereas the great amount of drunkenness which existed in our city on the Christmas holiday, Monday, Dec. 23, 1881, shocked the moral sense of the community, dishonored the day and brought disgrace upon the fair name of the city, and

Whereas the City Council, with a view to preventing the recurrence of such drunkenness on the approaching New Year's holiday, has passed an ordinance forbidding the sale or other disposal of spirituous, vinous or fermented liquors on Monday, January 2nd, 1882, the day to be observed as New Year's day; now, therefore,

I, Feramorz Little, Mayor of Salt Lake City, do hereby certify that the said ordinance, calling the attention of all persons concerned to the provisions of said ordinance and warning all those engaged in the liquor business to desist from the sale or giving away of spirituous, vinous or fermented liquors on said day, as the ordinance will be most rigidly enforced.

The City Marshal is charged with the enforcement of said ordinance and is authorized to engage all the police force necessary to execute the same.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the corporate seal of this city to be affixed, at Salt Lake City, this 31st day of December, A. D. 1881.

CITY COUNCIL.

Pursuant to call of the Mayor, the City Council convened in special session, at 8 o'clock p. m. Friday, December 30th, 1881.

After the usual preliminaries, the Mayor stated his objects in calling the Council together. In pursuance of an expression of the Council at its last sitting, that a proclamation be issued forbidding the sale or other disposition of spirituous, vinous or fermented liquors on Monday, January 2d, 1882, to be observed throughout the city as New Year's day, the Mayor stated that he had consulted with Mr. Rawlins, concerning the matter, and in his opinion the more effective method to accomplish the result would be in the passage of an ordinance by the Council. One of the Mayor's objects in calling the Council on this occasion, was to afford the Council an opportunity to consider the advisability of passing such an ordinance. Another reason for calling the meeting was for the purpose of considering an ordinance to extend the time for registering voters for the city election of 1882.

The matter of passing an ordinance for prohibiting the sale of liquors on New Year's was first considered.

A bill for an ordinance restraining the sale of spirituous, vinous and fermented liquors on Monday, January 2d, 1882, was presented, considered and passed. (See ordinance published elsewhere.)

A bill for "An ordinance extending the time for the registration of voters and the return of election lists for the city election of 1882" was then, taken up and considered and regularly passed.

The special session adjourned sine die.

Burglary at Ogden.—The Ogden Herald says that, yesterday morning, when Mr. Reggel went to his clothing store, on Main Street, he found that a quantity of his goods had been turned topsy turvy and mixed up. He went to the door of the room in the rear of the building, when he discovered that a burglarious entrance had been effected to his premises.

On further examination, Mr. Reggel discovered that a great many of his goods had been stolen, consisting of cloth, overcoats, pants, vests, shirts, under-clothing, and a number of other articles, amounting to a considerable sum, but the exact value in money has not yet been ascertained. Boxes containing gloves, handkerchiefs, etc., were opened and some of their contents taken out. The thieves effected their entrance by first whittling a large hole in the wood work, and then breaking away some boards.

Up to a late hour yesterday afternoon, no trace of the burglars had been discovered.

Religious Resolves.—The opening of each New Year is a time of good-resolution making. What an excellent thing it would be if each member of the community would keep in view the essence of the religion of the Saints, that it may enter more fully into the affairs of every-day life. It will soften the steps, tune the voice to melody, fill the eye with sunshine and check the impatient exclamation and harsh rebuke. It will make people polite, deferential, courteous and considerate. It goes into the family and keeps the husband from being cross when dinner is late, and keeps the wife from fretting when he tracks the newly washed floor with his muddy boots, and makes him mindful of the scraper and the door mat; keeps the mother patient when the baby's cries, and amuses the children as well as instructs them, and makes the happy home like the "New Year" hearing in blossom at once the beauty of the tender blossom and the glory of the ripened fruit.

Gay Time at Big Cottonwood.—We have received an account of a picnic party of the Primary Association of Big Cottonwood Ward which occurred on that Monday, at the school-house. The affair was gotten up by the president of the Association, Esther H. Davis, and assistants. Large tables were spread with the good things of life, of which 423 persons partook. A few hours were spent in singing, reciting, dancing and other amusements. The food that remained, after the feast, was collected and subsequently distributed among the poor. In the course of the evening Bishop D. B. Brinton was presented, by the association, with a beautifully framed photographic likeness of the late Apostle Orson Pratt. There was a Christmas tree twelve feet high, from which were suspended 141 gifts, which were distributed among the children. Mary H. Sutherland is secretary of the association.

The Contract.—E. R. Young, of Washpish, has a heavy force of men at work cutting ties, destined for the Oregon Short Branch Railroad. His contract is for 100,000, with the privilege of more.

Home Mission.—Home missionaries will visit the city Ward tomorrow evening.

AN ORDINANCE.

RESTRAINING THE SALE OF SPIRITUOUS, VINOUS, AND FERMENTED LIQUORS.

SECTION 1.—Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City, That no person, firm or corporation shall, within the limits of said city, sell, barter, or otherwise dispose of spirituous, vinous or fermented liquors, on the 2nd day of January, A. D. 1882, the day to be observed as New Year's day, and any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined in any sum not exceeding ninety-nine dollars.
