Iron.—The annual meeting of the I. M. C. U. for the election of officers was held at the President's office in this city yesterday. The only change made in the officers of the company was in the election of Jno. R. Winder as one of the directors. After the election of officers Superintendent Thomas Taylor, who had just returned from Iron City, reported progress. According to his report he has been exceptionally successful in accomplishing the objects of his visit to the South. Mr. Robertson, who is thoroughly conversant with the construction of furnaces, and the manufacture of iron has commenced operations, and expresses himself much pleased with the prospects. A superior article of fire-stones has been found in the vicinity of the works. The excavation for the main building is completed, and a large amount of rock for the foundation is on the ground. Most of the iron required for the construction of the furnace has been arranged for on very favorable terms. A considerable amount of supplies for the works is already stored in the company's storehouse, and it is intended that the work of constructing the large furnace (four times as large as the one formerly in use), shall move right along as fast as practicable. In addition to the blocks of stock subscribed in this city, several thousand dollars have been taken in the Southern settlements.

Z. O. M. I.—The 29th semi-annual meeting of the stockholders of Z. O. M. I. was held at two o'clock this afternoon, but adjourned without business until four o'clock, for the convenience of the stockholders. At the adjourned meeting directors and officers for the ensuing year will be elected and the president's report will be read.

We understand that a Directors' meeting will be held on the 11th of September, at which the report of the Secretary and Treasurer will be read and adopted by the Board. In this report it was recommended that a dividend of five per cent. for the half-year be declared. This action—by the adoption of the report—was taken by the Directors, and will be incorporated in the report of the President, which will be presented to the stockholders at the adjourned meeting this afternoon.

Figures at present are not accessible in relation to the position of the Institution, but we are enabled to state as a fact that it is in a remarkably healthy and thriving condition and doing an extensive business. Doubtless the stockholders will feel amply satisfied with the half year's return on their investment, which is certainly a very fair one.

Theatre.—A fair audience witnessed the presentation of "The Green Lanes of England," a drama of striking and exciting interest, by the Home Dramatic Club, last night. Little Miss Baby Clawson, for one so young, showed extraordinary talent and comprehension of her part, made necessary in some of the scenes toward the close of the piece. The performance gave, we believe, unqualified satisfaction to the audience.
