LOCAL BRIEFS.

Five deaths have been reported from diphtheria in the Bryant school district the past few days.

Judge Ritchie has admitted Ludwig Vollhard, formerly of Germany, now of Salt Lake, to citizenship.

A mass meeting of the W. C. T. U. will be held Sunday at 3 p. m. in the First Congregational church.

The annual meeting of the Daughters of the Confederacy is being held this afternoon in the Kenyon hotel parlors. Mrs. Mary C. Leigh, aged 72, of Paducah, Ky., and mother of C. B. Leigh of this city, died yesterday, from pneumonia.

The first of a series of winter schools will be given in the Fifth ward amusement hall tomorrow night. Good music and an excellent dancing floor ought to make the occasion most enjoyable.

Judge Willis Brown of the juvenile court will deliver an address at the parents' meeting in the Franklin school this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock. His subject is: "Protection of Our Girls."

James R. Craig of this city filed application yesterday afternoon, with the state engineer for 14 sec. ft. of water from the Green river in Utah county. He desires to irrigate 80 acres through an abandoned Indian canal 50,000 ft. long.

The case of D. W. Tracy of Price, charged with murder, was given to the jury yesterday. Tracy killed his father-in-law, James Taddei, in a quarrel resulting from Mrs. Tracy getting a divorce which Tracy believed was due to Taddei's meddling.

The funeral services over the remains of the late William Thomas Harris will be held Friday at 11 a. m. from the funeral chapel of Joseph William Taylor, 21 South West Temple street. Friends are invited to attend. Interment in City cemetery.

City Manager P. E. Leonard of the Bell Telephone company will be promoted Nov. 1, to be superintendent of construction. Vice Harry Summers promoted to be general superintendent of the system. Mr. W. W. Wolf of Chicago will take Mr. Leonard's place.

A proclamation was issued yesterday afternoon by Gov. Cutler in which Col. Joseph Georgehan was appointed as a delegate to represent Utah at the Interstate Commercial Law convention to be held in Chicago on Thursday, Oct. 26. Col. Georgehan will leave for the convention on Saturday.

Banner of Peace Now Floats Over County Slag haulers.

Commissioners Wilson and Miller were successful in their labors with the teamsters hauling slag for this county yesterday afternoon and a strike was averted. The eloquence of the county officials convinced the teamsters that they were in the wrong and they decided to go along with their work at \$2.25 per day and agreed to use the regulation wagon box, 19 inches deep and 9 feet long, on their wagons, and haul an average sized load each trip instead of one-half or three-fourths of a load.

SEVERE ON THE S. P.

Jury Awards Another Neglected Passenger the Sum of \$1,250.

Following the precedent established by the jury in a similar case in Judge Ritchie's court recently, a jury in Judge Lewis' court yesterday afternoon returned a verdict for \$1,250 in favor of plaintiff in the case of J. A. McCollum against the Southern Pacific company. The action was brought to recover \$1,000 as damages for being compelled to ride from San Francisco to Ogden in a second class coach which was poorly heated and ventilated and contained no drinking water and was occupied from Reno to Ogden by a number of drunken men who insulted plaintiff and used vile and abusive language and were guilty of obscene and indecent conduct.

The jury in the case of T. M. Matthis against the Southern Pacific company, which was tried several days ago in Judge Ritchie's court, rendered a verdict in favor of plaintiff for \$1,000. The third case of the same character and arising from the same facts is on trial today in Judge Lewis' court. The plaintiff is Agnes W. Fitzgerald and she asks judgment in the sum of \$1,000.
