The case of Dr. Duggs against the board, now in the courts, furnishes an interesting example of the statement of the board itself. As far as the News is concerned, it has no side in the dispute either with Dr. Duggs or the medical board, yet it was simply a matter for the public interest. Dr. Duggs has manifested the kind of "free cause" which he usually has given a name to as a practitioner, physiologist, whose theories have been recommended by his students that he practiced if January 1st, 1900, paying the fees \$5, stating that he belonged to the regular, homoeopathic school, mainly of physicians. He had promoted himself as a graduate of the Medical College, and was practicing medicine in this territory about the year 1876, and was licensed to practice in this application, and on August 25th, 1900, some months after the
