Between 50 and 60 carloads have al-ready been shipped by the dealers, and hundreds of wagon loads have been taken away by team. The shippers have been out of cases for several days, and in consequence shipping of peaches was discontinued, causing much waste of good fruit. More cases are on the road, and when they arrive, exporting of fruit will be resumed.
