Be it enacted by the Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Utah: That Joseph Young, sen. have the right to establish and control afterry or ferries on Bear river, for the term of four years from and after the passage of this act; at such place or places as will best subserve the public interest between a point one mile below where the p esent ferry crosses the river and to a point sociation. up said river, one-half mile easterly from the Bear river in Box Elder county.

Sec. 4. The said Joseph Young, sen., shall give bond and security to be approved by the Territorial Treasurer and filed in his office, in until the next regular election. the penal sum of five thousand dollars (\$5000) payable to the people of the Territory of Utah, conditioned for the faithfully carrying out the provisions of this act, and to indemnify any person for damages they may sustain on account of neglect, or carelessness, on the part of the proprietor of said ferry, ferries or bridge, while receiving toll therefrom.

Sec. 5. If any person or persons shall establish a ferry within the aforesaid described limits on Bear river, or establish a ferry or bridge on the Malad, within one mile each determine. way from said Joseph Young, sen's., ferry or bridge, and take toll thereon, without a grant from the Legislative Assembly, shall forfeit and pay to the people of the Territory of on said ferry or bridge, to be collected as an action of debt.

Sec. 6. The said Joseph Young, sen., shall make a true report under oath to the Territorial Treasurer of the amount of meneys and property received for toll on said ferry and bridge, and pay ten per centum of the afore-

Sec. 7. All acts or parts of acts in anywise conflicting with this act are hereby repealed.
