Officer Layne inulred into the circumstances of fair and decided only to take gun away from the woman and to det her go home to the baby. An effort was made to locate Brown but he had made good his escape.

About a year ago the Browns had some desperate troubles, at that time he was drinking heavily and it was claimed he tried to kill her. He was arrested, but the matter was fixed up and he was taken to Denver by rela-tives to get him out of the state. A short time later Mrs Brown anyled for short time later Mrs. Brown applied for a divorce, but before the matter came up they patched up their differences and the suit was dropped. She went to Denver with their children to try life over again with him. She says that for a short time he was all right, but storted to drink again and treated her cruelly. About a month ago she left him and came home to Ogden bringing with her the children. Since then she has been living with her father, Harry liteath, an Jefferson avenue. Brown followed her to Ogden in a short time. Since his arrival here they have had several meetings that were in no way pleasant and Mrs. Brown fearing her life took to carrying a mistel. Sorenson and Joseph Sceley were the committee, and they reported that they found the fattory in splendid sanitary condition; also, the farm dair, ies which supply the milk. There was an all of prosperity evident on every side as the farmers supplying the fac-tory were geting average returns of \$10 per cow per month, and those who leased their cows realized 60 cents on the dollar value of the same. The committee thought the conditions for a successful plant were as favorable in Mount Pleasant us at Richmond. Mr. Racliffe, the manager, who has been erecting factories in various parts of the ountry, suggested that the com, mittee return home and have the vi-cinity within a radius of five miles of Mount Pleasant uivided into dis-tricts and have the same carvassed to detarmine the number of pounds of milk that can be procured how and that can be milked. He promises that as soon as 20,000 pounds of milk can be guaranteed, a factory will be built.
