Papers for Italian Dynamiter Issued And He Will Be Returned-

Extradition papers for Francesco Ciddeo, wanted in British Columbia to stand trial for alleged dynamiting of a hotel and the attendant killing of a hold and the attendant killing of the proprietor's daughter, have at last been issued.
