

CLEANER CLOTHES AND LACKED EYE.

Were Initial Cause of Damage
Suit for \$400, in the City
Court.

OLGA MARTIN BADLY BEATEN.

Woman is Again Plaintiff in a Case
That Was Aired in the Police
Court.

A damage suit has been filed in the city court by Olga Martin against Arthur W. Peters, the proprietor of a clothes cleaning and repairing establishment in this city, to recover the total sum of \$400 as damages for an assault alleged to have been made upon plaintiff on June 15, 1904.

Plaintiff alleges that she sent some clothes to defendant's place to be cleaned and repaired and that when he and a man employed by him, named Ern Frederickson, returned the goods to her home on the above date, she became engaged in a dispute with Peters over the price for the services.

In the mix-up which followed she claims that he used vile, abusive and insulting language towards her and, not being satisfied with that she alleges that he held her and told Frederickson to strike her. The man did as instructed and severely beat and bruised plaintiff about the head and permanently impaired the sight of her left eye.

She was compelled to pay out \$24 for medical attendance and claims that she has been disabled in the sum of \$475 by reason of her injuries making the total amount of the judgment asked \$499. At the time the affair took place Frederickson was arrested and fined by adding that plaintiff took in the brutal assault and now plaintiff seeks to make Peters pay for the attack.

LE GRAND YOUNG WINS.

Victory on Appeal to Supreme Court
Over Rock Quarry Boundaries.

In the case of the Washington Rock company against Le Grand, Young and Lorenzo Price, appellants, the judgment of the Third district court has been reversed by the supreme court in an opinion written by Chief Justice Barth and concurred in by Justices McCarthy and Gresham. The case was brought to determine the ownership of a rock quarry, which plaintiff claims is located on its land while defendant Le Grand Young claims that, according to the original survey of the land made by Deputy U. S. Surveyor Dickert in 1881, the quarry lies on his land. Judgment was rendered in the lower court in favor of plaintiff.

The testimony showed that Judge Young owns the northwest quarter of the southeast quarter of section 12, township 1 south, range 1 east, Salt Lake meridian, and that defendant owns the northeast quarter of the southeast quarter of the same section. According to subsequent surveys of the land the quarry was brought within the boundary of plaintiff's property. In its opinion reversing the judgment of the lower court the supreme court says in part:

INDIAN WAR VETERANS.

Interesting Meeting—Officers Elected
And Business Transacted.

During conference week an interesting meeting of the Indian War veterans of Utah was held in this city. Its purpose was to elect officers for the ensuing year and to arrange for the securing of the medals voted by the legislature for the veterans of the war. It was decided that the occasion of receiving the medals from the legislature would be an appropriate one for holding a big reunion, and plans for the occasion were informally discussed.

The following officers were selected: commander, J. M. Westwood, senior vice commander, R. N. Bennett, Sanpete county; junior vice commander, J. D. Pierce, Washington county; adjutant general, J. M. Westwood, Utah county; quartermaster general, Edwin Lee, Utah county; chaplain, N. C. Murdoch, Wasatch county; state chorister, George Harrison, Utah county.

A committee of five, composed of Andrews, Commander-in-Chief Westwood and Adjutant General Pratt was appointed to make arrangements for the securing of medals or medals voted by the legislature.

Many stories of early days in Utah were told by Jesse N. Smith from Snowflake, Arizona; James Andrus, A. Hatch, Robert G. Gentry, George Harrison, William E. Black, George Carlisle, N. C. Murdoch, E. D. Wooly, Mans Manson, Joshua Terry, Isaac Packer and George Taylor, being among the speakers.

Before adjournment a general invitation was extended to all veterans to meet in the annual campfire reunion at Payson, during August.

SAN FRANCISCO MURDER MYSTERY

That Surrounding Death of Biaggio Vilardo, the Young Sicilian, Has Been Solved.

HE WAS KILLED WITH A CLEAVER

Crime Was Committed at No. 730 1/2 Green Street—No Notice Has Been Discovers.

San Francisco, April 8.—The mystery of the murder of Biaggio Vilardo, the young Sicilian who was killed with a cleaver on Wednesday evening, and whose head, arms and legs were hacked from the bleeding trunk, has been solved. The atrocious crime was committed at 730 1/2 Green street, in the house of Pietro Torturiti, also known as Peter Torti, who is believed by the detectives to be the murderer, and who is being held in custody. His wife Rosa, as well as Filippo Peretta, Salvatore Morando and Rosario Domina, wanted as witnesses, have been arrested, and the police expect soon to have Torturiti in custody. The bloody cleaver, which was the weapon used to cut down his victim, was found under a sink, and in the basement were discovered missing bones of the victim.

Biaggio roomed in the place and boarded with the family. On Wednesday Mrs. Torturiti went out while her husband and Vilardo were at supper. When she returned at night she found the body of her husband cut short with the remark that it was none of her business. He then went out and has not since been seen.

A search of the house showed that Vilardo's room had been the scene of the terrible tragedy. It bore the appearance of a slaughter house, all efforts to remove the evidence of the crime having proven unavailing.

In a lower part of the building human bones, not yet dry, and a blood-covered cleaver such as is used by butchers and fishermen, were unearthed and the detectives pronounced the chain of evidence against Torturiti complete.

Rosario Domina, one of the persons now in custody, is the witness in the Biaggio murder case who at first was supposed to be the victim of the vengeance of the "Black Hand" society, which the officials think planned the murder of those whose testimony might convict the assassins. Vilardo was an intimate friend of Biaggio, collected money to defray his funeral expenses and was supposed to be active in the prosecution of his case.

After the police took possession of the Torturiti home today, Sam Boscafrume, a friend of the family, called on the immediately arrested. He said that he knew nothing of the murder, but admitted that Mr. and Mrs. Torturiti, with their 5-month-old child, stayed at his house on Thursday night. The detectives are confident that they also were there on Friday night, and think that Torturiti is not far away now, though his wife disclaims all knowledge of his whereabouts.

The suspected murderer is an employe of the American Can company. He is about 25 years of age, five feet three inches tall and weighs 140 pounds. The exact nature of his employment has been carried from his home on Wednesday night weighed 150 pounds. His wife is a young and attractive woman and the detectives are now dividing their search for a motive between the theories of jealousy and the operations of a secret society.

The murderer attempted to conceal his evidence by the crime by whitewashing the wall of the room in which it was committed, but crimson stains are plainly visible through the new white surface.

Mrs. Torturiti declares that neither she nor Vilardo ever gave the husband any cause for jealous suspicion. She asserts that she has been in constant dread of her husband, who has a very violent temper, and that on the night Vilardo was slaughtered she was not aware that they had quarreled in any manner over her.

When Vilardo's body was recognized yesterday by Philip Peretta, Captain of Detectives Burnett detailed Detective Sergeant Ed Wren, Ed Gibson and Detective Mattheison to remain at Peretta's light, and today the constant urging and threatening Peretta urged the police to the home of the alleged murderer.
