### LOCAL BRIEFS.

Prof. Levi E. Young will lecture at the regular M. I. A. meeting in the Ninth ward tomorrow night.

May Cowan, oldest daughter of John Cowan of Atlanta, Ga., and formerly of this city, has just died of typhoid fever.

Part of the proceeds from Purple day will be given by the Elks toward the purchase of several deer elk for Liberty park.

The level of the great lake is reported nearly one foot lower than it was a year ago, a fall of two inches in the last two weeks.

A jag was considerably burned last night at Cadet's park while acting off fireworks at the display in honor of Admiral Togo's victory. He will recover.

A grass fire on Third South between Second and Third East streets this morning called out the apparatus from the central station. No damage was done.

H. H. Hart, LL.D., of Chicago, who is at the head of the Children's Home & Aid society there, will be in this city the latter part of next month, and arrangements are being made for an address before the Boys' Betterment league.

"A Chapter in the History of Liberty" is the subject of an address to be given at the Twenty-first Ward meetinghouse tomorrow night by Daniel Hartmann. In addition there will be a special musical program of patriotic selections. The public is invited.

Hay Bagshaw, who was given a preliminary hearing in Judge Ditch's court yesterday morning on the charge of embezzling a horse, an account of which appeared in last evening's paper, was ordered this morning to be held to await the action of the district court.

The sad information has reached this city of the death at Denver of Mrs. Rebecca Utter, wife of Rev. Dr. David Utter, pastor of the church of Unity in that city. The cause of death was stroke of apoplexy. Mr. Utter has lived in this city since Dr. Utter was the first pastor of the Unitarian society in Salt Lake, and left many friends here.

## COUNCIL WILL HELP BOULEVARD

Pledges Itself to Appropriate \$1,000 For Bridge Across City Creek.

### IMPROVEMENTS TO BE MADE.

Resolution for Immediate Action is Blocked by Black, Who Offers an Amendment.

The city council last night pledged itself to appropriate \$1,000 for the construction of a bridge across City creek at the entrance to the canyon so that the plans for the proposed new boulevard may be carried out. It also agreed to make other improvements in the canyon as suggested in a communication from the Commercial club. The money for the bridge will be forthcoming when the club raises its \$5,000 for general improvement. The petition from the club asked that the council take action on the following suggestions:

#### SUGGESTIONS MADE.

(1) Authorize the construction of a concrete bridge over City creek at a point where the stream is intersected by the proposed road, said concrete bridge to cost not to exceed the sum of \$1,000.

(2) That you direct the removal of the rock crusher now being operated in City Creek canyon at as early a date as possible.

(3) That you terminate, as soon as is consistent with the public obligations of the city, the leases under which the sand and gravel rights are being worked in said City Creek canyon, and that no new leases of like kind be made so far as that particular locality is concerned.

(4) That the powder house now in City Creek canyon be removed.

(5) That you direct the beginning of work on the proposed bridge at the intersection of Third street and Canyon road, and that you order the opening of said Third street from State street to Canyon road.

(6) That your honorable body indicate your intention to spend and otherwise maintain in good condition the proposed boulevard when the same is completed.

(7) That your honorable body begin at once the work necessary to accomplish the objects herein and heretofore set forth.

#### BLOCKED BY BLACK.

A resolution was introduced by Wells authorizing the board of public works to enter into a contract for the construction of the bridge. Teddenham favored the resolution and urged its adoption. Black moved as an amendment that the whole matter be referred to the city engineer and the committee on public grounds and transportation. The engineer furnished an estimate of the cost of the work and the plans for the same. The amendment was carried and the council will act on the matter as soon as the plans are prepared and the Commercial club takes its \$5,000 towards the boulevard.
