## FUNERAL DIRGES FOR THE SALOON

Mt. Pleasant Brass Band Serenades the Liquor Emporiums of the Town.

### HIGH LICENSE CLOSES THEM

Streets crowded until a late hour with men attending the impressive obsequies.

MT. PLEASANT, Oct. 1.—Last night the saloons of Mt. Pleasant were open for the last time, the saloon men refusing to pay the \$2,000 license levied by the city council. It is the determination of the council to enforce the law. Heretofore fines have been imposed upon persons selling liquor without a license and the effect has not been what was desired. Now the ordinance is so drawn up that breakers of the law can be imprisoned as well as fined, and it is hoped the results will be more satisfactory.

COUNTY CLERK'S REPORT.—The county clerk's monthly report for September shows that the receipts amounted to \$2,292.45 compared with \$2,158.55 for the same month last year.

N. D. CORNER LECTURES.—N. D. Corse of the McKeon Post, G. A. R. lectured last evening in Odd Fellows Hall on "Some Notable Losses in Native" before an appreciative audience.

Souvenirs for all Governors.—Governor Spy is sending a medall of virgin copper as a souvenir of the Utah exhibit to the governor of each state. They are being mailed in small plush boxes.

Salt Lake Custom Figures.—Salt Lake imports for the first seven months in the year amounted to \$28,327, as compared with \$27,818 for the corresponding months of the previous year. In July last the import's were \$6,250 as compared with \$788 for July 1908.

Rebuilding Plant.—P. J. Moran's plant at the mouth of Little Creek canyon, which was burned Thursday evening, is being rebuilt. His bid was \$5428.50 and the work to be completed in 270 days. The property owners will pay a total of \$42,767.15 and the city's portion only amounts to \$11,000.

Woolgrowers Meet Monday.—The sale meeting of Utah sheep growers will be held Monday in the Judge building offices of the Utah Woolgrowers' association, with address from Chief Murray of the Bureau of Animal Industry and State Veterinarian A. C. Young.

Much Smallpox Reported.—Thirty cases of smallpox are reported at one town in Rich county, and Secretary Bentz of the state board of health urges vaccination, deprecating at the same time the prejudices against it. He also says that failure to immunize whooping cough is criminal negligence.

Panzer Report Filed.—James Sabine, county pauper clerk, filed his report yesterday with the county commissioners. During the last month \$1,928.10 was spent for coal and groceries and \$245.60 was spent for rents and railroad fares. This is about \$390 less than was spent in September 1908 for the benefit of the poor.

**FUNERAL OF DR. NILES.**—The funeral of Dr. Niles was conducted this afternoon by the Rev. D. Sanders of Oakland, California. The pallbearers were Drs. S. C. Baldwin, Union Worthington, J. S. Richards, C. P. Whitmore, J. S. Richards, E. W. Whiteman, R. D. Smedley and A. C. Ewing. Services at the grave were private.

**Postoffice Receipts.**—Postmaster Thomas's report of the postal revenue for the month of September shows an increase of 12.62 per cent over the month of September, 1908. The statistics for the month are as follows: Stamps, \$22,371.89; cards, \$830; envelopes, \$2,967.65; total, \$28,159.45. The average daily sales were \$1,126.78. The total receipts for the month of September, 1908, were \$25,143.51.

**Sheriff After Fugitive.**—Sheriff Joseph C. Sharp left last night for Los Angeles to bring back Capt. C. Andrews, who is held there by the police as fugitive from justice. He is accused of embezzling about \$4,000 from the Salt Lake branch of the Klein Fruit company of Los Angeles while employed as a collector in the company. He is charged with the embezzlement of \$59.80, but it is understood that his defalcations cover a period of several years. Andrews has promised to return without fighting regulation.

**Going After Gunther.**—Governor William Spofford issued a requisition for the return of George L. Gunther, charged with grand larceny, who was arrested in Chicago last week at the request of the Ogden police officials, yesterday. Detective J. F. Pender left last night for the prisoner. According to the complaint Gunther was employed by Mrs. Hildahl Ringdahl to assist her in cleaning house. When he was away for a few minutes when she returned Gunther was gone and he took \$180 which she had hidden in a cracker box.
