This was the only means of identification found on the dead man's body except on his white shirt and underclothes was found the laundry mark, "H. 14," and a laundry bill sent from Logan to the Troy Steam Laundry, Og-The man was well dressed, wearing a brown overcoat, dark brown coat and vest, striped pants, black hat, and white shirt, white collar and red bow. He is a man about 35 years of age, dark hair, long sandy mustache, blue eyes, medium complexion, 5 feet 7 inches in height, would weigh about 160 pounds, wore a No. 8 Hamilton brown congress shoe. The remains were taken in charge by Larkin & Son, and are now at their morgue awaiting identification. 
