THROUGH IDAHO. An Excursion in which Business and Pleasure are Happily Combined.

MORMON WARD, Gentle Valley, Brigham County, Idaho, May 9, 1890. [Correspondence of the Deseret News.]

For the purpose of visiting the settlements in the Oneida State of Zion, I left Logan, Utah, on the 9th inst. after attending the Cache State quarterly conference.

I traveled by train to Preston, Idaho, where I addressed the Saints in the evening according to the invitation of the committee.

Preston is the second ward in the Oneida State. It contains 100 families belonging to the Church, most of whom live in a scattered condition on their farms and ranches within a space of country about four miles square, extending east to the mountains, south to the Whitney Ward, west to Bear River and north to the Hilderbrand Ward.

The town of Preston is situated on the Northern Pacific Railway, seven miles north-west of Franklin and the same distance north of the boundary line between Utah and Idaho.

It contains sixteen ten-acre blocks, and is perhaps as beautiful a townsite as can be found in Southern Idaho.

It is being built up quite fast, and fine thirty shade trees are planted along the sidewalks of the principal streets.

A new Academy building is also in course of erection, which when completed will add considerably to the importance of the town.

A new meeting house is even contemplated in the near future, and altogether the saints of Preston seem to be an industrious and prosperous community.

The soil within the ward is rich and fertile, and the farming lands are irrigated from Warm Creek (which cuts through the ward from north-south) and Cold Creek.

To convey the water from the latter stream a canal was constructed a few years ago at a cost of \$30,000, the water to be used for irrigation.

The water to be used for irrigation is conveyed to the farms by means of a canal which is considered the best of its kind in the valley.

From the summit of this ridge, the beautiful landscape is presented. A fine level country stretches for miles and miles southward, dotted with farms and ranches.

Within the limits of the ward, there are many fine farms and ranches, and the people are generally well-to-do.

The center of Mink Creek ward, the place where the meeting house stands between the junction of Birch Creek and Mink Creek proper, is about fifteen miles by road north-west of Preston.

On Thursday morning Bishop Rasmusson, who has presided over the Mink Creek Ward since its organization in 1871, started with the toward Gentle Valley.

After following the Deer Lake road up Strawberry Creek for about five miles, we turned to the left, climbing the mountain or dividing ridge between Strawberry Creek and Gentle Valley.

This mountain stands a solitary hill, far away from all other human habitations, and in a position that it necessarily must be exposed to the full fury of the storms so frequently raging on the top of the Wasatch Mountains.

Upon reaching the summit, a man who has been regularly employed in a crowded European city. What a change in the mode of living and surroundings!

After leaving this hermitage we soon came to another ridge, from the top of which Gentle Valley lay open to our view, and descended a very steep hill, which made us query why the people of Gentle Valley do not make a road down the canyon, through the valley.
