**LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.**

**Pleas Not Guilty.**—Cole, the Ogden seducer, was arraigned before Judge Emerson, the other day and pled not guilty to the charge made against him.

**To-Night.**—Carter's dissolving views will be exhibited at the 12th Ward Assembly Rooms, this evening at half past 7 o'clock. All should attend.

**Free Music Lessons.**—Mr. John M. Chamberlain, the popular music teacher and composer, will commence on Friday evening, at 7 o'clock, in the Eighth Ward meeting house, to give gratuitous instructions in vocal music, to all who are disposed to join his class. Only 50 cents admission fee, will be required, for the purchase of suitable books. He will give lessons every Friday evening, at the same hour and place, during the winter.

**Personal.**—We had a pleasant call to-day from Col. A. G. Brackett and Major A. W. Evans, both of the Third Cavalry, the former stationed at Fort Russell and the latter at Fort Steele. They are engaged on the Court Martial now pending at Fort Douglas. They are fine, intelligent gentlemen, and are spending their leisure moments in looking in to Salt Lake institutions and affairs. We are pleased to meet them.

**Shot Himself.**—The Junction says:

On Sunday last Mr. A. Harris, son of Mr. Joseph Harris, of this city, met with a painful accident at Terrace. It seems that the injured party was handling a pistol, and while in the act of returning it to his hip pocket, it went off. The bullet struck the young man in the right hip, striking the bone and glancing downwards about five inches. As soon as it happened the young man took the train for Ogden, and when he arrived at Corinne he sought out a surgeon, who extracted the ball. The injured man then came to Ogden where he is at present stopping at the residence of his parents, on Main Street.

**Fight in a Saloon.**—A brawl took place in John Lollin's saloon about half-past two o'clock this afternoon. The parties were arrested and the case is having a hearing as we go to press. One of the combatants states that he was standing talking to another person in the saloon, when his opponent came up and interfered. He pushed him aside and the other struck him. The fight then commenced in good earnest and both were pummeled unmercifully. He, whose version is given above, was scratched and bruised about the face, and his brother who tried to separate the two, received a severe contusion near the eye. The other man's eyes were injured so that a bandage was necessitated, and the fingers of one of his hands were dislocated. Both parties are said to have been drinking some, previous to the encounter.

**A Fall in a Lamp Oil.**—A young lady in the 15th Ward, last evening started to go down a flight of stairs with a lighted lamp in her hand, when she stumbled near the top and went rolling down the whole length of the stairway into the hall. It was luckily a Student lamp ("for which we get \$4") or there would doubtless have been a burnt homestead in that neighborhood before morning. As it was, everything that could break about the lamp was shattered, and the steady caught fire in two places. The lady and gentleman of the house rushed into the hall, and each clapping a hand over the burning spots, immediately extinguished the flames. The young lady who fell was found with her head somewhat near the center of the earth than her feet, doubled up in a corner, awfully frightened, but not hurt a particle. There was "no oil in the lamp" of that household, for the remainder of the evening.

**Antelope Decoy.**—A decoy for antelopes, as used by the Indians, has been sent to the Deseret Museum by Tarlton Lewis, Esq., of Richfield, Sevier County. It is the head of a young prong-horn antelope (*antilocapra americana*) ingeniously prepared by the Indians. It was found in Rabbit Valley by Brother Benson Lewis, who secured it for the Museum, where it was delivered by courtesy of Nathan Tanner, Esq., of South Cottonwood. The eyes of the antelope have been well imitated in shape and color, and made from a jet-like substance, such as is found in the mineral wax of Utah. Holes have been bored at each end of the eye, in which animal fibre has been fixed to secure the eye in the socket of the eyeball. The artificial eye has then been fixed in place with mineral wax (cozocrite). As a specimen of Indian industry, the head is a curiosity. Bro. Tanner states that the skin of an antelope is placed around the head, so as to decoy the antelope to the spot where the Indians are concealed.

**"Enquirer" Items.—From the Enquirer of yesterday.**

It is reported that a young man named Haws, of this city, killed one grizzly and two brown bears in Provo Canon two or three days ago.

We learn that Elders W. M. Bromley and N. H. Groesbeck, of Springfield, have recently been called by the First Presidency to go on a mission to Auckland, New Zealand.

We are pleased to learn that Mrs. Hannah Cornaby, of Spanish Fork, has, in compliance with the wishes of her appreciative friends, determined to publish a volume of her excellent poems and songs, including an autobiography of the author. The cheerful and interesting style of Mrs. C.'s productions, combined with the piety of her life and devotion to the cause of truth are well known.

The son of Mr. Heber P. Kimball, who recently came to this city for the purpose of attending the Academy and has been suffering with diphtheria, is recovering. An impression seems to be abroad that the young man contracted the disease after his arrival here. This is a mistake. He was stricken with the disease evidently before his departure from Salt Lake, arriving at breakfast before taking the train, and it was not until after his arrival in Provo that his complaint was discovered to be diphtheria.

On Monday night last Mr. W. H. Brown, a recently discovered couple of men who were camped close by his land, which is fenced in near the Provo bridge, in the act of using a portion of his fence for a camp fire. This had not been the first time that travelers had burnt up portions of his fence for a like purpose, and it very naturally made him suspicious. In return for the two men got "sassy" and intimidated that the owner of the fence might do as he pleased if he did not like their mode of doing business. Will, however, started for town and made the matter a complaint before Justice Booth. Officer Thurman was dispatched at once to arrest the parties, who by this time were ready for a compromise, and to security in the shape of a watch and some silver for the appearance of the fence despoilers next morning. **Railroading in Colorado.**  
 TOLLEY'S GRADING CAMP,  
 Navajo River, Conejos County,  
 Colorado, Nov. 7th, 1880.

Editor Deseret News:

We are working under the head of the Nephel Board of Trade. We have got one mile of grading to do, which we are very busy with at present. There is a great deal of timber to clear off, some blasting to do and the river to turn in one place, making altogether about two months' work. There is the number of men out here from Utah, who are out of employment. We have some of them here every day for something to eat. They state that some men by the name of Florida engaged them to come out here and work for him, as he had a large contract on the railroad. When they arrived, they were told to pack up and leave, and they were turned loose, as they Florida could not peddle off to the railroad company. We have one of the men cooking for us here. He says that Florida gets one into this country and all the others tell the same story. There are plenty of men here who are looking for work, and when he arrived at Corinne he sought out a surgeon, who extracted the ball. The injured man then came to Ogden where he is at present stopping at the residence of his parents, on Main Street.

**Florida's Men for the Rio Grande Railroad.**

GROVER'S GRADING CAMP,  
 Navajo River, Conejos County,  
 Colorado, November 7th, 1880.

Editor Deseret News:

The undersigned inhabitants of Salt Lake City and vicinity, request publication of the following: On the 25th of October 250 men hired by the Florida Co. to work on the Rio Grande railroad, proceeded from Ogden Depot about 2 p. m. very slowly and safely until just before arriving at Rawlins, where a collision occurred, happily without danger, except a severe shaking. We were then detained about seven hours while the track was cleared. Nothing of importance occurred until our arrival at San Antonio, Col., where we were detained one day awaiting our baggage. The utmost confusion prevailed in messing the men at the several restaurants, they were marched to parties, like soldiers, in groups of 30 and 50. The next day we proceeded en route for the end of the track, a distance of about 40 miles. Upon arrival one car got off the rails, and great excitement in consequence of the threatened danger, a chasm of 5,000 feet on one side, induced several of the men to escape by the window, others crowding to the doors to make their exit. Order being restored and the car safely on the track we finally arrived at our journey's end and about 9 p. m. No provision had been made for our coming, supper not being ready until about 9 p. m. The baggage of those who were fortunate enough to get it was, however, about 11 p. m., sleeping accommodation none beyond the cars or the open air. Several of the men lost their lives, and one person losing his effects at \$100. No compensation from the company as Florida received checks for the whole baggage, and he did not seem disposed to obtain employment from other contractors. Some were successful, others not. Persons who were promised contracts by Florida, were disappointed and deceived. In fact the utmost dissatisfaction prevails among the men, in consequence of his failing to give the men employment on his own contract. (50 miles of road which we learn he never had and never will have. If report is true, Florida received from the company \$5 for each man brought to the end of the track, and \$25 per diem for personal expenses. This method of obtaining men and money would seem to be very appropriate before the war, but since which we learn he has been a successful man. By publishing the foregoing, you will confer a great favor and perhaps will cause a tendency to deter other men of Utah from leaving their homes and families, to be sold in a similar manner.
