Washington, 18.

The President has sent to Congress

to-day a communication extolling Gen.

Hancock's administration, and asking

Congress to take suitable action. He

said Hancock is the only officer of the

American army, in high command

south of the Potomac, who, since the

close of the civil war, has been influen-

ced by the example of Washington, and

who scrupulously abstained from violat-

ing the legal and constitutional

rights of his fellow citizens. He sug-

gests some public recognition of Han-

cock's patriotic conduct by the House.

Elliot offered a resolution, asking the

Secretary of State for information with

regard to American whalers being or-

dered off the Russian coast of America,

by Russian vessels.

Garfield, from the Military Commit-

tee, reported a bill giving honorable dis-

charge to all persons relieved from

charge by absence from the army with-

out leave. Pending the debate, the

morning, hour expired, and the bill

went over.

Butler reported a bill of appropri-

tions to supply the deficiencies in the

execution of the reconstruction law.

The whole amount appropriated is

\$12,665,000.

The Speaker presented the President's

Message in commendation of General

Hancock. There was some amusement

on the occasion, by its reading, on the

Republican side. It was ordered printed.

Stevens introduced the bill, which he

sought to introduce yesterday, with re-

gard to reconstruction, and, in order not to

to retard the passage of the bill, with-

drew the section with regard to the

election of Congressmen in the South-

ern States. The bill passed.
