SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 5.—Howe

and Davis (Ill.), presented petitions

of masters, pilots, mates, engineers

and others of the United States,

praying for an amendment to the

law in regard to the employment

of aliens as pilots, so as to require

applicants to take the oath of al-

legiance before receiving a license,

and also to satisfy the inspector

that they reside in the United

States; referred.

Conrad presented a petition

in favor of the reorganization of the

silver dollar and increasing its

weight so as to make it equal in

value to the gold dollar.

Beck presented a memorial from

the State of Kentucky, signed by

the governor thereof, asking Con-

gress to make an appropriation to

pay the balance due to the State

for expenses incurred in equipping

troops during the late war; re-

ferred.

Ferry, from the committee on

postoffice and post roads, reported,

with amendments, the Senate bill

to regulate the compensation of

postmasters, and for other pur-

poses. Placed on the calendar.

Conkling presented a petition

signed by a large number of promi-

nent citizens of New York in regard

to the family and suffering in

northern China, and praying that

a commission be appointed from

residents of China to act in con-

sultation with the United States

minister in procuring and distribut-

ing relief. They also suggest that

the unexpended balance of money

received from China in 1859 be

used to relieve the sufferers; re-

ferred.
