## INQUEST OVER JOSEPH WOOD

Jury Finds That He Came to His Death by Natural Causes.

## INSURANCE INCREASE UNJUST.

So Held by Real Estate Dealers—Special Officers Sworn In—Wrestling Bout Friday Night.

Ogden, June 7.—A coroner's inquest over the remains of Joseph Wood, whose lifeless body was found Tuesday night on the side of the mountain in Ogden canyon, along the city water-works pipe line, was held at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, before Judge J. S. Murphy and a jury composed of Thomas Farr, Amos Sebring and John H. Brown. Dr. J. S. Gordon, Undertaker Larkin, Deputy Sheriff Clark, Robert Shipley, T. Shipley and Henry Hutton were the witnesses examined. Their testimony went to show that deceased had been subject to pain around his heart, and that everything indicated that he had been stricken with apoplexy and fallen to the ground, dying without a struggle. The jury, after hearing the evidence, brought in a verdict that he came to his death from natural causes, the exact nature of which was unknown. His body was removed from the undertaking parlors last evening to his late home, 247 Monroe avenue. The funeral will not be held until Sunday, the time and place will be announced later.

## SPECIAL OFFICERS.

Sworn in to Protect Throbs from Pickpockets and Holdups.

Ogden, June 7.—Chief of Police Browning and Sheriff Sebring, in expectation of the usual number of crooks who travel around the country following such gatherings as the United Commercial Travelers, have put on duty a number of special officers to protect the people from pickpockets and holdups. What is supposed to be the first of that gang was taken in custody last evening on the charge of passing worthless checks. He gave his name as Miller and says he has money in the bank, but the officers doubt his word. He passed one check for \$20 on Ed Bell. Should his statement be true he will be released at once, otherwise punished for obtaining money on worthless checks.

## OPERA HOUSE COMPANY INCORPORATES.

The Provo Opera House company has filed articles of incorporation with the county clerk. The company is incorporated to conduct a theater and opera house business in this city and owns the Provo Opera house purchased from Jesse Knight, valued at \$15,000, which is the amount of the capital stock. The shares are of the par value of \$1, of which Jesse Knight holds 14,350, and the other incorporators, J. William Knight, W. Lester Mangum, Amanda M. Knight and Joseph B. Keeler, 10 shares each. The incorporators form the board of directors, with Jesse Knight, president; J. William Knight, vice president, and W. Lester Mangum secretary and treasurer.

## HOMES FOR NEEDY.

Mayor Schmitz Has Plans for Furnishing Them to S. F. Poor.

San Francisco, June 6.—That it is proposed for San Francisco to get into the business of providing homes for the needy of the city was intimated by Mayor Schmitz today. The mayor outlined a plan for investing \$2,000,000 in houses and lots, the scheme being to have the city enter the building and loan business on an immense scale. It is designed to have the purchasers repay in the form of nominal rents at a low rate of interest.

## JUDGE HARGIS INDICTED.

Jackson, Ky., June 6.—The Breathitt grand jury returned an indictment today against Judge James Hargis, former county judge of Breathitt county, charging him with the murder of Dr. B. D. Cox, who was assassinated nearly three years ago here on the streets.

## ANNA T. FARGO WINS.

Albany, N. Y., June 6.—The court of appeals yesterday affirmed with costs a judgment of \$2,262 in favor of Anna T. Fargo of Wyoming county, and against the supreme tent of the Knights of the Macabees of the World, a fraternal organization. The case is of interest in view of the fact that plaintiff's husband, who held a policy in the organization, committed suicide and despite the fact that the by-laws state that no benefits shall be paid to the survivors of a member who commits suicide, whether sane or insane, the lower courts awarded the plaintiff a verdict and the highest court in the state has affirmed the judgment.
