### THE ADOPTION LAW.

WE publish to-day the Act of the Legislature providing for the adoption of children. It is a good measure but would have been more complete if it had not been shorn of an important section, which appeared in the original bill as follows:

Sec. 8. The father of an illegitimate child, by publicly acknowledging it as his own, receiving it as such, with the consent of his wife, if he is married, into his family, and otherwise treating it as if it were a legitimate child. it as if it were a legitimate child, thereby adopts it as such, and such child is thereupon deemed for all purposes, legitimate from the time of its birth. The provisions of the foregoing sections do not apply to such adoption.
