Lewiston, Cache Co., Oct. 22.—The sugar factory had some little trouble in starting, but everything seems to be running smoothly at present, although it is not running its full capacity on account of the scarcity of hands. There is being delivered at the fac-tory an average of about 800 tons of beets per day, and up to Oct. 20, 9,300 tons of beets have been delivered, and out of the amount 3,400 tons have been worked up and 4,800 bags of sugar turned out.

SERIOUS LOSS BY FIRE.

Two Hundred Tons of Hay Burned, Loss \$1,000.

Special Correspondence. Cowley, Big Horn Co., Wyo., Oct. 22-Yesterday, just at the time for the after-noon meeting, a cry of fire was raised and on investigation it proved to be the hay-stacks of W. E. Holyoak and President Jesse W. Crosby's farm by Mr. Holy-oak. About 20e tons of hay was destroyed. The farm is located about three miles west of Cowley. A large force of men and boys succeeded in saving the third crop of hay and two stacks of alfalfa seed. The loss will be about \$1,000 divid-ed equally between the owners. The origin of the fire is not definitely known, but it is supposed to have origi-nated from a fire started near the stacks by some boys on Saturday. The boys threw water on their fire and supposed it was extinguished but it must have been smoldering and the wind yesterday morn-ing revived it. This loss will fall heavily on Mr. Holyoak as it constitutes a great portion of his summer's work.
